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### He'll Be First to Zoom Into Air Like a Rocket

Los Angeles, Calif. (NRA)—Old-time test pilots agree there's about only one unique thrill left to be experienced in aviation.

They have done "twice" than the speed of sound, blacked out, bailed out, cracked up, spun, looped, dove wings off planes and barely escaped death in a thousand hair-raising ways.

But no member of their fraternity has ever before zoomed straight up in the air in a plane from a dead stop, in the manner of a rocket.

Now, however, it falls to ace Lockheed test pilot Herman H. (Fish) Salmon to try to prove that the human brain and frame can tolerate such an experience.



**Rocket Preview**  
He is the pilot who will first fly the Navy's revolutionary XVF-1, an experimental aircraft built to take off vertically into the air without a runway and then fly like a conventional fighter.

"I expect it will probably afford a preview of the sensation man will experience in high-speed rocket flight take-off," Fish says.

This man, who could go down in history as opening the door to the sensation of flying to the moon, is a deceptively quiet, relaxed individual.

Lockheed test pilot Herman H. Salmon says that when you really get to know Fish, however, you discover that he's exactly like the movie-version of a test pilot. His attitude is deceptively easy, his "unwobbliness" and he has an unswerving fondness for practical jokes.

At 40 he shows surprisingly little of the wear-and-tear of one of the longest test pilot careers in the business. He's tall and lean and only the deep creases around his eyes reveal his age.

Fish is a native of Milwaukee, Wis., and began flying around the dairyland state when he was 18. Although only a raw youth he flew with all the old pioneers of aviation, experimenting with many air circuits and stunts.

In 1940 Fish turned his flying talents to more profitable ends, accepting the job he now has with Lockheed. Since then he has test-flown just about every military and commercial type plane Lockheed has made.

He did all of the spin tests on the old P-38, flew half the dive tests on the P-80 and P-94 and did all the certification tests on the Constellation and Super-Constellation.

One of Fish's values is that he has picked up a comprehensive knowledge of the complex aerodynamic problems involved in modern supersonic flying. His title is "engineering test pilot" which means that he gets the first-hand by flying and then works with the engineers in interpreting it later.

**Makes Plane Models**  
His hobby is making and flying model flying racing planes. His shop, which is bigger than a two-car garage, is loaded with all kinds of fancy power tools and gadgets. He also gets a kick out of driving his block-long Cadillac sports car at high speeds.

Speaking of his job with the XVF-1 he says:

"It will be an uncanny thing to fly, because of the terrific power available for acceleration and deceleration. There's nothing today which will give a similar sensation. The flight position is one of the more unusual features of the plane which a pilot will have to get used to."

For Fish's first flights in the plane, Lockheed has designed a conventional, non-retracting landing gear. He will take it off the ground like any other plane. But

Vancouver, B. C. (AP)—British Columbia University's new fisheries instructor, Dr. W. A. Clemens, says he will recommend special courses for fishermen to help Canada meet the growing competition from Japan in world markets.

# Congress Ponders Oppenheimer Case

Some Communists and fellow travelers years ago, but said he thinks his experience makes him more fit to serve the government. He is contesting the charges and has asked for a hearing. Since June 1952 he has been an AEC consultant.

Cole and Hickenlooper said in a joint statement yesterday that when the "orderly review" of the case is completed by the AEC, the Senate-Atomic Energy committee will be in a position to take whatever action, if any, may be appropriate in the public interest. Cole is chairman and Hickenlooper is vice chairman of the group.

The AEC said that "properly requires that it make no further statement" pending a decision.

"The disposition of this case is within the responsibility and authority of the Atomic Energy Commission," Cole and Hickenlooper said. "The joint committee has found no fault with the procedures taken by the Atomic Energy Commission in this case."

"We do not believe it necessary for further Congressional action at this time."

**Inherited Scientist**

Former President Truman was asked to follow a speech at the University of Missouri, declining to comment in detail, he said.

"I inherited Dr. Oppenheimer. He was considered a great scientist—one of the greatest—in connection with the atomic bomb. Don't convict anybody by implication or guess."

In August, Mr. former AEC member Sumner T. Pike said the charges which brought Oppenheimer's suspension seemed to be the same days when he had been weighed by at least three government members personally.

"Personally, I never had the slightest question of Dr. Oppenheimer's devotion to the United States," Pike said in an interview. "I may be what they are calling 'politically naive' or 'soft toward Communists,' but I don't think so."

Pike, an AEC member in 1946-51, is now chairman of the Maine Public Utilities Commission.

Sen. Bridger (R-Mont.) said today the late Sen. Arthur Vandenberg (R-Mich.) had reviewed Communist association charges against Oppenheimer several years ago.

# Mayor Sullivan Loses Election In New Britain

(Continued from Page One)

Mayor Sullivan was able to seat five aldermen on the Common Council, including two aldermen at large. Present council set up is 11 to 4 Democrat.

Scott will go into office with 10 Republicans and five Democrats on the council.

Yesterday's election held statewide interest because of Sullivan's desire to run for governor—a desire he made public to a television audience in 1952 when he was campaigning for his second term as mayor.

He said that sometime after 1953 he'd like to run for governor.

Sullivan went into the 1952 majority election against the Republican incumbent, Mayor George A. Quigley. He was defeated by nearly 10,000 votes.

But things were different this year. He barely won the Democratic nomination in March by defeating former Alderman Vincent Kotowski by a slim 420 votes.

Kotowski had campaigned on the same issue Scott campaigned on—the property re-annexment program.

Sullivan never got much support in his aspiration to run for governor, neither from State Democrats nor leaders here.

However, political speculators had it that if he won yesterday he would have a chance of winning the Democratic nomination would have been enhanced.

His defeat, they now say, leaves him out.

Scott's first crack at politics was in 1950 when he was the campaign manager for Robert H. Hausman when the latter unsuccessfully sought the GOP nomination for mayor.

But in 1952, Scott himself took to campaigning, this time for himself. He ran for the State Senate but was defeated.

Republican State Chairman Clarence F. Baldwin called Scott's victory "an outpouring of confidence in your ability to initiate in New Britain the high ideals and principles in government which have been so effectively demonstrated by Republican administrations on national and state levels under the leadership of President Eisenhower and Gov. Lodge."

**CARRIER WELCOMED**

# Lizards, Frogs Tell Pre-Jee Age Story

Los Angeles (AP)—Fossils of lizards and frogs tell story of pre-Jee age climate that the bones of mastodons and sabre tooth tigers, says a zoologist. Large animals could easily walk away from an advancing glacier, but it might take a lifetime for a small lizard to crawl out of a large valley. Edward Burtin, zoologist at the University of California at Los Angeles, reasoned. This bone of small animals unable to get away tell more about the climate of a particular area than those of more mobile beasts.

Studying small fossils from the Los Angeles basin was a grassy woodland covered with large oak and walnut trees, with probably less rain than it has now. Fossil lizards and snakes in Nevada caves indicate the Los Vegas area 10,000 years ago was a desert, but not as dry as now. Burtin from said one million years ago Florida had a subtropical climate—reptiles and amphibians found there survived the inundating ice in more northern areas.

Energy Commission General Advisory Committee in 1948 for the judgment and recommendations of the latter body. The charge is that Oppenheimer opposed our immediate concentration of all our resources on the development of the hydrogen bomb because he was a Communist agent. He himself says that his opposition was based on both moral and scientific considerations, and he points out that subsequent scientific developments, which came later, were the things which cleared away the technical difficulties he had seen obstructing progress toward the hydrogen bomb.

But, in this phase Oppenheimer was one of eight distinguished members of the same General Advisory Committee. And all eight were unanimous in giving this nation the same advice Oppenheimer gave it. The Atomic Energy Commission's report on the hydrogen bomb program, dated January, 1950, for the start of the hydrogen bomb program. It is, then, one must credit Oppenheimer with the ability to dominate several other distinguished members of the committee, and force his own views upon them, or one must conclude that all eight of them were Communists. Or, one can conclude that all eight were Americans.

In any case, the man who built the bomb is on trial again, with the issue that of whether or not he was fit to do it. There is every indication that the hearing will be fairly conducted, and that the verdict, when it comes, will be as just as the facts warrant.

It is to be noted, in the department of Washington purity, that the present scandal in the Federal Housing Administration is one which was brought into the public light by the Eisenhower administration itself, that the accusations are falling on Eisenhower appointees and Democratic holdovers alike, and that the probe which is now to follow gives every sign of being unprejudiced, rigorous and uncompromising.

In one view, this is actually smart politics, for an administration which is not afraid to tackle its own faults and weaknesses, until yesterday, at least, to capitalists and to the public at large, that there was the reason for this nation's delay on the hydrogen bomb, just in the midst of the Senate subcommittee investigation of the McCarthy-Cohn dispute with the Army.

Now, what the Oppenheimer case itself? This much seems certain, that this particular scientist was at one stage of his career, in the midst of various Communist associations, by marriage, by family relationship, by friendships. He himself has admitted candidly enough about these things, and has many times explained them to the satisfaction of various individuals and groups in the general Groves, when he was Oppenheimer's superior in Manhattan Project, as to Admiral Strauss, the present head of the Atomic Energy Commission, and as to the whole Commission when it considered these charges once before and cleared him.

Despite these associations, Dr. Oppenheimer became the man who was entrusted with the job of building the first atomic bomb, and who did it, and who still remains one of our foremost experts in the field of nuclear physics. He is now under investigation again because he still holds a post as an unpaid consultant to the Atomic Energy Commission. Surveying his general record, it should be quite obvious that his service has been to this country, that it has been distinguished, and that it has been efficient. It would seem that, whatever his background before 1941, he had sufficiently earned the gratitude of this nation, and its loyalty to him.

There is, however, one inference or charge, which alleges that this country cannot let his services stand unchallenged, and that he has entered the country's service. This inference or charge concerns not what he did before he began working for the country, but something which happened after his main service had already been completed, and it alleges that, even at that late date, he was not an individual to be trusted. This something was a little booklet toward the hydrogen bomb project, when it was submitted to the Atomic

### Bolton Area School Head Urges Boost in State Aid Grants

Bolton, April 13 (Special)—George Graff called for increased State school aid for towns in Connecticut during a meeting of the Bolton Board of Education at the Elementary School last night. Graff, made his recommendation in answer to a questionnaire addressed to the board by the Connecticut Assn. of Boards of Education which was attempting to determine local reaction to the present policy of the State education aid.

Graff said he believed the present rate of State compensation was "most unsatisfactory," and alleged that the State only paid from 25 to 30 per cent of school costs. He added the national average for state aid to schools in the neighborhood of 51 per cent.

Graff, who is in charge of eight "Tolland County Schools," asked the board to apply pressure on the State Legislature to regain the favorable proportion of State aid they had in former years.

He cited town reports over the past several years to substantiate his belief that State aid for schools had dropped considerably in Connecticut in recent years.

The board asked Graff to draw up a list of recommendations on the State aid issue.

Meanwhile in Mansfield further weight was added to Graff's views when Joseph N. Gill of the Mansfield Board of Education asserted the State "is nothing but a piker" when it comes to educational aid. Gill addressing some 200 persons at a meeting of the Mansfield Parent-Teacher group last night, said "less than 20 per cent of public education costs are borne by the State whereas the national average is 50 per cent."

Industries have tended to centralize, Gill said, while the thousands of employees have become residents of suburban communities away from the industrial center.

"It is our responsibility to provide education for the children of the employees of those industries and yet we receive no help financially," Gill said.

He urged a bipartisan move to "do something about this State aid situation."

**Custodian Issue Remains**

In other matters discussed during the Bolton meeting, it was voted to accept the resignation of Floyd Adams, school custodian, who had previously asked to retire from his position because of illness at home.

Board Secretary Norman Peters read a list of applicants who had answered a board advertisement to succeed Adams. Persons who wished to be considered included four Manchester men: Ernest McValley, 24; Ronald Langard, 47; Paul Shea, 40; and Harry Hensel, 47. David Toomey, Jr., of Bolton, also applied for the job.

The board spent considerable time discussing a proposed salary scale and hours schedule for the new custodian. No agreement was reached, but the possibility of more than one custodian (the second to be on a part time basis) was given serious study.

Superintendent Graff said in general the people are not fully appreciative of the detentions of the job, which must be done to meet what most Boards of Education require.

### The McCarthy Story (8) Senator vs. Army Fight Has Raged Since 1949

(Continued from Page One)

around to the armed services, however, you seemed thus far to have investigated only the Army in any major way. Is there any reason for that?"

McCarthy: "If we found any Communists in the Air Corps or in any other branch, we of course would have to expose them. We have only found them in the Army so far."

McCarthy had not yet entered the field of Red-hunting when he fired his first shot at the Army. That was to come almost a year later. But even then he displayed the same driving force in the same type of controversy which has made him the most talked-about figure in American politics today.

Accused Baldwin

His first brush with the Army came over the Army's handling of the prosecution of German SS troopers accused of slaughtering 160 Americans in the infamous "Malmedy Massacre" of World War II.

Before the hearing was over he had charged a Senate investigating subcommittee with planning a "whitewash" of the Army and accused the committee chairman, Sen. Raymond Baldwin, Connecticut Republican, of acting "criminal wrong."

He demanded a Senate probe of all the Army's crimes trials in Europe. He called for State Dept. and Army officials to testify in a committee when it refused to use said that unless they promised

Baldwin declared McCarthy apparently had accepted the word of Hitler's men as to what happened over "the sworn testimony of American officers and military personnel."

Probe Called Farcical

McCarthy called Baldwin's inquiry "a sham, a farce and a very deliberate attempt to whitewash." He ripped into Baldwin for retaining the committee chairmanship when his law partner — Mel Dwight Fanton — was involved as a principal in the conduct of the trial.

It was a verbal whipping of the likes of which the said Senate hadn't heard in years. A friend of Baldwin's said it was a factor in the Senate's decision to resign from the Senate and accept a judgeship in his home state of Connecticut.

In the end, McCarthy won. The death sentences of the six Germans were changed to life imprisonment. Two years later McCarthy made his attack on Gen. Marshall.

The implication of the speech was that the American armies — through decisions by Marshall — had been sent against Germany in such a manner that Eastern Europe was left to the Red armies, perhaps deliberately. McCarthy pictured Russian expansion after the war as a result of a deliberate "backstab" from "Victory" by U. S. policymakers.

McCarthy said: "I realize full well how unpopular it is to lay hands on the laurels of a man who has been built into a great hero . . ."

"New Lapses of Honor

"We are presently a professional soldier who has given his lifetime to the service of his country. I should hesitate to lay hands on his laurels. We cannot too much honor the men who have dedicated their lives to our military service. We can afford to deal lightly with their mistakes of judgment, but not with their lapses of honor."

or, Had Gen. Marshall been content at the end of World War II to rest upon his laurels instead of assuming command of our military and political decisions and himself with stubborn zeal at the side of the old Acheson-Roosevelt crowd, we might never have found occasion to audit what he did in World War II."

McCarthy said the most significant decision in World War II was this: "The decision by Marshall, which was made against Roosevelt's half-hearted wishes and Churchill's bullock determination, to concentrate on France and leave the whole of eastern Europe to the Red armies."

The generally accepted concept of western Allied strategy in World War II was that the channel invasion was made because it was the most direct route to the heart of Germany — and the least costly in lives.

Conspiracy in strategy

However, McCarthy saw an ominous conspiracy behind this strategy. The Senator said Marshall "triumphed" over Churchill in the decision to attack across the channel rather than via the Mediterranean and the Balkans to seal off eastern Europe from the Red armies.

Speaking of the first Quebec Conference in 1943, McCarthy said: "That conference marked the end of Churchill's sway over the great decisions of war — a sway almost unparalleled in history."

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### Stoppage of Beer Brings a Recue

St. Louis (AP) — Robert Moore found himself accidentally locked inside a tavern cooler room which he was repairing.

With the temperature near freezing, the shirt-sleeved repairman shouted and pounded on the six-inch walls for half an hour to no avail.

Then he had an inspiration. He cut off the supply of beer piped from the cooler room to the tavern tap. That brought Herbert Kempke, the tavern owner, on the run.

### Camping a Help In Heart Cases

New York (AP) — Outdoor camping can be good for children with heart trouble — and for their parents, too, says Dr. Katherine Dodge Brown, pediatric cardiologist at New York Heart Hospital.

She says cardiac children too often are overprotected, denied their normal experiences and "fed to their mothers' apron strings. Specially supervised camps, she says, can help child morale — and improve parents' attitudes.

### The Doctor Says

#### Surgery In Making Strides In Treating Varicose Veins

Millions of people are suffering from varicose veins. Some of them are young people, and some are old. The disease is a common one, and it is a serious one. It is a disease of the veins, and it is a disease that can be treated.

Although varicose veins and various ulcers are primarily diseases of the middle and later years of life, younger people are also sometimes troubled with these conditions. Occasionally they even seem to be a family ailment.

Standing too much, overweight, childhood chronic constipation, the wearing of tight bands around the legs or hips, all apparently contribute to the development of varicose veins. Hence, as in so many disorders of mankind, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

The veins near the surface of the body all have folds or valves which prevent the blood from flowing the wrong way. The pressure on the valves in the veins of the legs is especially great and they are often broken. When this happens the necessary support is lessened and the vein becomes swollen. It is these swollen blood vessels which are called varicose veins. Swollen veins are unsightly, and women especially dread them for this reason almost as much as because of the complications which they may produce.

People who have varicose veins are more likely to have swollen feet or ankles than those with normal veins. Also the poor circulation brought about by varicose veins can produce ulcers. Such ulcers sometimes become enormous and cause great pain.

Several ways of treating varicose veins and ulcers have had much success. The use of elastic bandages which support the widened and enlarged varicose veins is, of course, an old remedy and helpful in many cases.

Varicose veins are often treated by surgery. Injections for varicose veins have been used for many years. Injections act by closing the opening of the varicose vein entirely so that the blood must flow through some other vein which is normal or less damaged in the tissue. At present, surgery seems to be becoming more popular as a treatment and injections less so.

The treatment of ulcers is still difficult, though several methods are fairly successful. It is best to try to prevent serious swellings or ulcers by taking proper care of the varicose veins when they first appear.

### Electronic Shopping in Prospect

#### Grocery May Be Like Ride on Merry-go-Round

New York—Don't be surprised to find a carousel and a machine spouting ready-to-eat hot dogs in 30 seconds the next time you go shopping in your favorite supermarket.

For supermarket people are poised to set off a "second retail revolution" with vending machines, electronic devices and revolving counters in an effort to boost sales. These people are the first revolution with decentralization and self-service of food. They already have some revolutionary new techniques in action. In Pittsburgh, for instance, one food super has installed an automatic vendor in the store window that dispenses doughnuts. It accounts for 25 per cent of the store's total doughnut sales, and 50 per cent of those sales come after the store is closed.

Chances are you've had the grocery store door slammed in your face at closing time on more than one occasion. Well, the supermarkets of the future plan to solve this problem by installing batteries of machines in the windows that will sell when the store is closed, as well as when it is open. Many stores are already selling cigarettes through window-type automatic vendors.

Some progressive grocerymen are even trying with the idea of a store in which the merchandise will simply be available "for inspection." Here's the way this futuristic food dream unravels: Electronic engineers have recently informed the gadget-happy supermarket people that they can see no serious technical problem in an "electric eye" installation that would flash a signal to the retail stockroom immediately when the stock of any item on a vertical, revolving shelf had dropped below a certain point. This device should solve the out-of-stock problem and keep the customer's blood pressure at a normal level.

Urgine, but listen. One supermarket in Maryland features seven electric turntables for food displays. Each table holds 1000 pounds of food items. They revolve at the rate of one revolution per minute and permit shoppers to help themselves to whatever foods are displayed.

### Cambodia Protesters Invasion by Reds

with her sister Indochina king-Don Laos.

They are the first incursions by Vietnam regulars during the seven-year Indochina war, which centers in the coastal state of Viet Nam and occasionally in Laos and Cambodia's King Norodon Sihanouk is reported preparing an attack by his own forces on the invaders.

The protest was lodged as Cambodia went into mourning over the death Sunday of more than 60 persons in a Vietnam ambush attack on a crowded holiday train.

Vietnam mines blew up a train crammed with people headed for the capital for the Cambodian new year. Vietnam units then came out of hiding and set off a fire to 38 years, most of them full of poor people.

The main violence of the Indochina war continued today around the besieged French town of Dien Bien Phu in northern Vietnam.

The French high command at Hanoi said the rebels and the defenders kept up a "violent" artillery duel last night and today, but the Vietnam still had not launched their expected new all-out drive for the overrun of the fortress by human tactics.

A French Army spokesman said yesterday a new massive general assault on Dien Bien Phu was to be expected at any moment. The first offensive probably would be to reach a strategic 1,200-foot hill just over a thousand yards from the heart of the fortress. A French counterattack captured it from the Vietnam last night and rebel forces to take it again have cost dearly to no avail.

The French also continued to dig in for the assault they say they are confident they can turn away. French Air Force planes yesterday parachuted tons of ammunition to the defenders of the fortress. Other struck heavy blows at the besiegers ringing Dien Bien Phu with heavy bombs and flaming jetted gasoline. Today, low clouds and fog sharply curtailed the aerial assault around Dien Bien Phu, but planes ranged elsewhere to hit rebel supply convoys from Red China.

The rebels fall this time. They take the fortress, the French believe, they may turn to all-out assaults on the French Red River delta—more vital to final victory than the Dien Bien Phu fortress. The French believe the rebels hope for victory over the remote fortress to strengthen the bargaining hand of Russia and Red China at the big power conference on the Far East at Geneva April 28.

But the French said they had beat off repeated Vietnam attempts to cut railway and highway links between Hanoi and the vital northern port of Haiphong through which tons of American military supplies are pouring daily.

U. S. Aid to Turkey Dates from Grant

Ankara (AP)—President Grant beat President Truman to the punch by more than 70 years with military aid to Turkey. Shukru Kaasabolu, local historian says the sultan sought to buy 600,000 Springfield rifles from the United States some months before Russia declared war in April 1917.

The makers couldn't fill the hurry-up order so President Grant authorized drawing 50,000 rifles from government stores for immediate shipment. Records indicate the American guns proved far superior to the rifles used by the Russians. The sultan was so pleased, Kaasabolu adds, that he dispatched a specially-woven Turkish carpet to Grant as a gift.

Under the aid program, which began in 1947, the United States has furnished Turkey with more than a billion dollars in military and economic aid. The purpose is the same: to bolster Turkey against Russia.

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Alcorn Discusses Objects of Rotary

One of the objects of Rotary is community service and it is important to every Rotarian, said H. Meade Alcorn at the Rotary meeting held at the Manchester Country Club last evening.
