Bolton Regional School Would Cost Town 1.3 Mill Tax Boost

Bolton, April 15 (Special)—David Yeomans, chairman of the 4-town Temporary Regional High School Planning Committee, told a well-attended P.T.A. meeting tonight that cost of the proposed high school would be 1.3 mills based on last year's grand list. He also stated that "all four towns are in the market for a school that will always have room for use."

Yeomans described the relative positions of the four towns stating that Hebron and its town of Andover are in the same position. They have been told that Windham is unable to take their students after June 1956.

He said Marlborough "is anticipating being asked out of East Hampton. The fact was brought out that Bolton also must face the same possibility with Marlborough within comparatively few years and in the meantime must anticipate an intermediate tuition increase with the building of Marlborough's new high school."

The local Board of Education recently addressed a communication to Sherwood Robb, chairman of the Manchester School Board, asking for a definite statement of the future status of Bolton students in the Manchester School Board.

Robb was unable to give an answer immediately but said the subject would probably be considered at an April 15 meeting of the Manchester Board.

Yeomans also pointed out that only three towns voted for the school the resulting plant would be slightly smaller, that the expense of provision for a regional school to take tuition pupils and that it would be difficult to add another town at a future date.

Yeomans spoke of the proposed simultaneous town meetings in 4-towns with a suggested date of May 10 and expressed his persistent hope that all four towns would vote affirmatively to hold a special election on the question on June 1.

These two steps, he stated, could be taken without losing control of the final plans. Creation of a regional board of education would permit the spending of those who are unable to attend the service. The service will be also made up of whom to consult. However, Yeomans said, the people would still have the opportunity to review the plans at the time of voting on the bond issue and of course, the school could not be built without a yes vote on this question.

In response to a question from the audience, Yeomans stated that "no money has been spared" in the committee's estimate of what the teacher salary scale should be. He stated that it is higher than Manchester and Windham and comparable to Hartford.

To arrive at estimated operating costs, the regional group worked on the premise that 1.3 of the staff would be in the town of Bolton and at least one teacher in each department with a minimum of 10 years experience.

It was stated that all planning had been ample so that the people of the four towns could be assured that the proposed school could be built and operated without it costing more than is estimated by the regional committee.

Accept Salary Scale—The local Board of Education received a letter from the teachers Tuesday night accepting the salary scale recently submitted to them by the board.

Cumulative Voting Under cumulative voting, each ballot may be cast either for 21 nominees, or concentrated with 21 votes on one nominee or split among several nominees in any proportion so long as the votes total 21.

So if a million shares are represented, this means a total vote of 21 million—enough to win a national presidential election not so long ago.

The tally of tabulating the vote falls on three tallies. Though the job sounds endless, McGinnis and Richard Joyce Smith, a special counsel for management, said the work could be completed swiftly—again, barring legal delays.

Pvt. Schine, Army Pride Issues in Latest Feud

(Continued from Page One) The McCarthy charge the Army attempted to "codify and promote" Communism and then tried to cover up for those responsible. McCarthy's treatment of Secretary Stevens, to whom the Senator once referred as "the finest dude I've ever met." McCarthy's accusation of "blackmail" and the charge that Stevens and Army General Counsel John G. Adams tried to get the McCarthy subcommittee to shift its investigation from the Army to the Navy, Air Force and Defense Dept. But the current controversy reaches as far back as September 1953. Demanded Army Records It was in September that McCarthy demanded that the Army furnish him the records showing who approved of Army officials. McCarthy said he suspected of being pro-Communist. First Army Headquarters refused the names on the grounds that such a disclosure would be a presidential directive issued by President Truman and never countermanded by President Eisenhower. From that time on, there was increasing friction between McCarthy and the Army. A dentist, who had declined to say whether he was ever a Communist, Perens received his discharge at Camp Kilmer, N. J. McCarthy called in Brig. Gen. Ralph Zwicker, Camp Kilmer commander, for questioning in a stormy closed-door session. McCarthy questioned the "honesty or intelligence" of Zwicker and told him "you should be removed from your command." Zwicker contended that in giving Perens an honorable discharge he was acting in the best interest of the Army. This was the situation into which Stevens stepped. He accused McCarthy of slandering and slandering Zwicker. He ordered another officer not to appear before McCarthy's committee. Stevens said he himself would appear instead. Charges Red Coddling Eisenhower backs Stevens. McCarthy lashed back at Stevens. He accused the Army of "attempting to codify and promote Communism" and of claiming "special immunity from legislative investigation and exposure of the misdeeds of its members." The Army acknowledges it handled the Perens case badly. Secretary Stevens made this statement even before Zwicker went before the McCarthy subcommittee. While Perens was being investigated by the McCarthy subcommittee, he was given an automatic promotion from captain to major by the Army. An Army officer said: "It was a plain case of a look-up. There's no doubt about it. This was one case where one hand didn't know what the other was doing. But it was a mistake in administration—not who approved of Army officials.
