would be re-assembled, and Molotov answered this by saying: "So far as Viet Nam is concerned France believes it is up to this conference to set the limits of the re-assembly zones, it being understood that the commanders in chief on either side would be consulted. The commanders would be in charge of carrying out the details of these re-assemblies."  
In his fourth question, the British Foreign Minister raised the issue of what should be done about guerrillas, and Molotov replied:  
"France has proposed the disarmament of the irregulars in Viet Nam the means of carrying out the disarmament ought to be decided with the conditions of re-assembly of the regular troops kept in mind."  
Eden's fifth question raised the question of international supervision.

not obtain any information on the fate of Brig. Gen. Christian DeCastries, heroic commander of the Garrison or General de Galle, Habroux, French Air Force nurse who was the only woman in the battalions during the long, bloody siege.  
Informants said the French and Vietnamese representatives rechecked their lists exhaustively to exhaust them.  
DeCastries was a prisoner, but they have not stated whether he was wounded. His body, however, made no mention of the nurse.  
Reports here that the nurse was killed are followed the seasonal monsoon rains.  
The wounded will all follow the same route—first Lung Prahang, then Hanoi and other points. All available nurses, doctors and ambulances in Hanoi were mobilized to receive the men.  
The French said yesterday's rebel attack was launched only 80 miles south of Phung, a key point in the delta on a direct route to Hanoi.  
The French said they used heavy artillery fire and "maxime" air assaults to repel the attack.

Dr. Keeney went to the witness chair and testified his first "hunch" was that the man in the white coat was Adams. He was certain of this in a late afternoon visit Jan. 22 from Adams and White House aide Gerald Morgan.

Dr. Keeney said Adams apparently had brought Morgan along only because the Senator and Morgan were friends, and that Adams' purpose was to "influence me" to have Sen. McCarthy abandon efforts to subpoena members of the Loyalty Board.

Dr. Keeney said he met on the following afternoon with McCarthy and other Republican subcommittee members and told them he had just heard a story which, if true, would mean that certain subcommittee members had been instructed not to testify on the following day.

Dr. Keeney said he also told the group it might be "advisable" to inform the Defense Department that it also might be necessary to fire Adams.

Adams' talk with him, Dr. Keeney said, dealt with the subpoena of the "Schine matter" coming up only as a side issue.

When the "Schine matter" arose, the Senator said, "it came in the form of a hint."

Dr. Keeney said he tried to call Adams' attention to the fact that the chief of staff, that night, failed to reach him, but did call him in the morning.

Dr. Keeney was thoroughly agitated. He said he informed the staff that "I was not going to be held up pending further inquiry, and shortly afterward called by telephone with McCarthy and Morgan, who said they would be making their way to the Capitol."

Dr. Keeney said that as soon as McCarthy returned the next day, they had a meeting with Sen. Foster (R-Mich.) present and, he believed, Mundi, too.

Cross-questioning Dr. Keeney, McCarthy asked if he remembered McCarthy had not been blackmailed into dropping any investigation, no matter what charges would be filed and no matter how embarrassing they might be.

"I think that's right," Dr. Keeney replied.

Under questioning by McCarthy, Dr. Keeney said there were "hints" at the meeting with Adams and Morgan, but that the question of the subpoena for Loyalty Board members was "coupled" with the "Cohn-Schine" matter.

McCarthy then asked whether there were not hints that the Army would issue subpoenas against Cohn if the subcommittee persisted in its efforts to question the Loyalty Board members.

Dr. Keeney said the question was whether the charges would finally come out in the open and reflect on both men (Adams and Cohn).

Under further questioning by McCarthy, Dr. Keeney said he "developed in his mind" from the conference with Adams and Morgan a belief that if the subpoena were not dropped, charges would go out against Cohn and Carr.

Mundi, following Dr. Keeney to the witness chair, said Adams came alone to see him, also on Jan. 22.

Mundi said that when he was told about Cohn's situation, he offered preferential treatment for Cohn's subpoena, but that the Justice Department had refused to justify the position of the Loyalty Board members.

He said he told Adams to go to Cohn's apartment and see him, and that he advised to discuss the matters with the committee counsel, Mundi added.

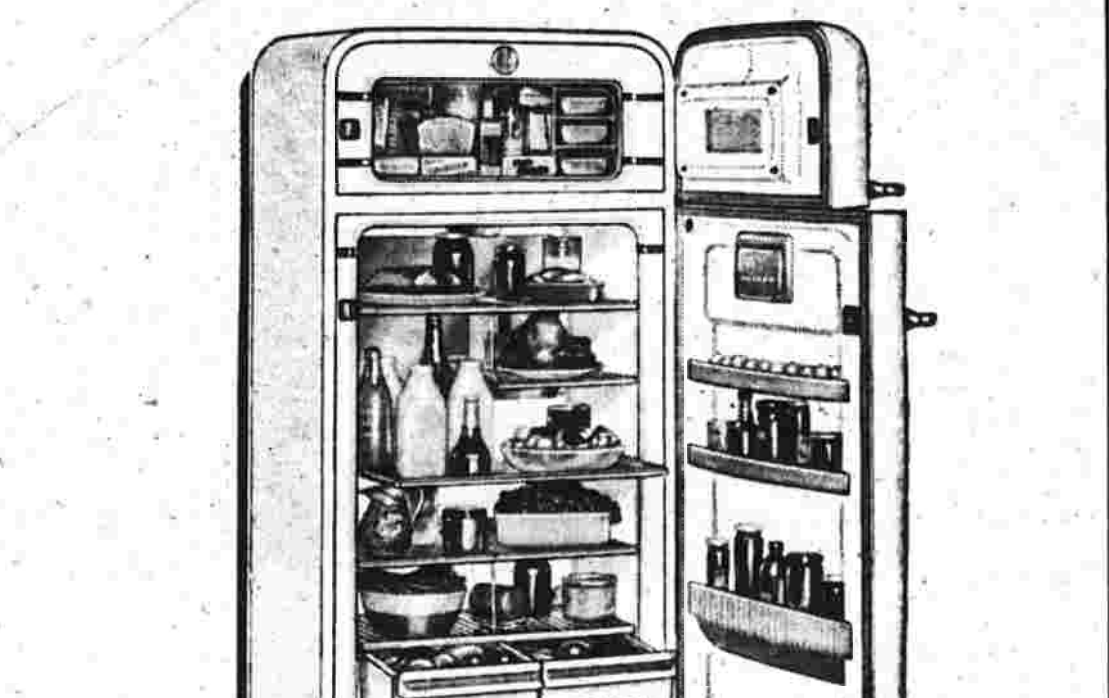
