Assembly agreed to go ahead and consider the resolution on the condition that the Laniel vote against the government. Laniel, however, voted against the government because of his feelings about the European Army issue.

The vote came shortly after Laniel pleaded for the lawmakers to keep him in unless an effective new government could be formed immediately. The lawmakers began casting their ballots only about two hours after the opening of the debate, a surprisingly short time.

In his brief address at the start of the debate, Laniel said he did not believe that a new team can be formed immediately with a large and faithful majority.

His words apparently fell on deaf ears. He got only scattered applause at the finish and none from the critical points of the Assembly where the most help would have been needed.

Laniel said that he did not believe that the assembly could accept an "Atlantic Munich" by agreeing to give up its fight on honorable terms in Indochina and he did not believe that a majority of the Assembly was willing to vote down the Atlantic alliance.

He implied that the defeat for his government might lead to one or both of these consequences.

Laniel said that those who had accused the government of not seriously seeking a peace in Indochina at the Geneva Conference might be destroying all that he had done for such a peace. He said that he did not believe that a crisis could be resolved quickly enough to allow a new negotiating team to go to Geneva in time to work effectively.

Laniel bitterly attacked the Communists as working against France's national aims and said he hoped that a change of government would not be brought about as the result of Communist tactics.

Laniel said that last Thursday when the assembly turned down a mildly worded resolution calling on the government to continue to seek a peace in Indochina, it had seemed to be voting against the continuation of the Geneva Conference and against the security of the French Expeditionary Corps in Indochina.

He said that this decision might be misinterpreted abroad, where the intricacies of French political maneuvering were not well understood.

Laniel pointed out that today's vote of confidence was on a question of refusing to consider three government proposals.

Comments to Indochina Seen

He then hinted again to do as he has in the past—that the government may be considered the necessary for seeking compromise to Indochina. He made mention of a Socialist resolution, which called for "compulsory" measures, such as the dispatch of conscripts to Indochina, susceptible of giving a new impetus to the war and to increase the already too heavy losses of the expeditionary corps.
