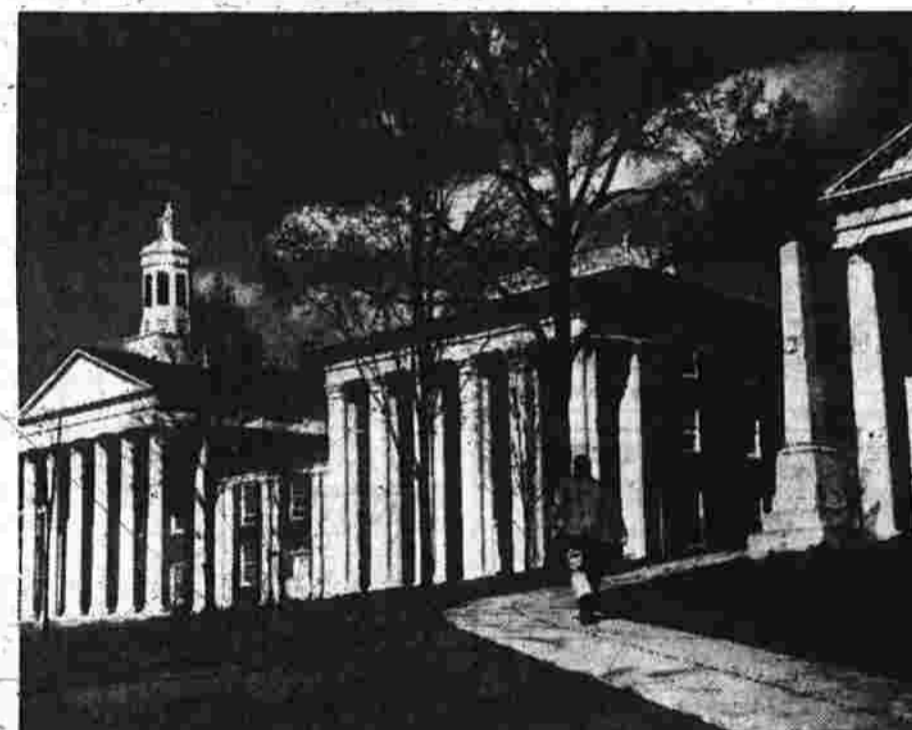

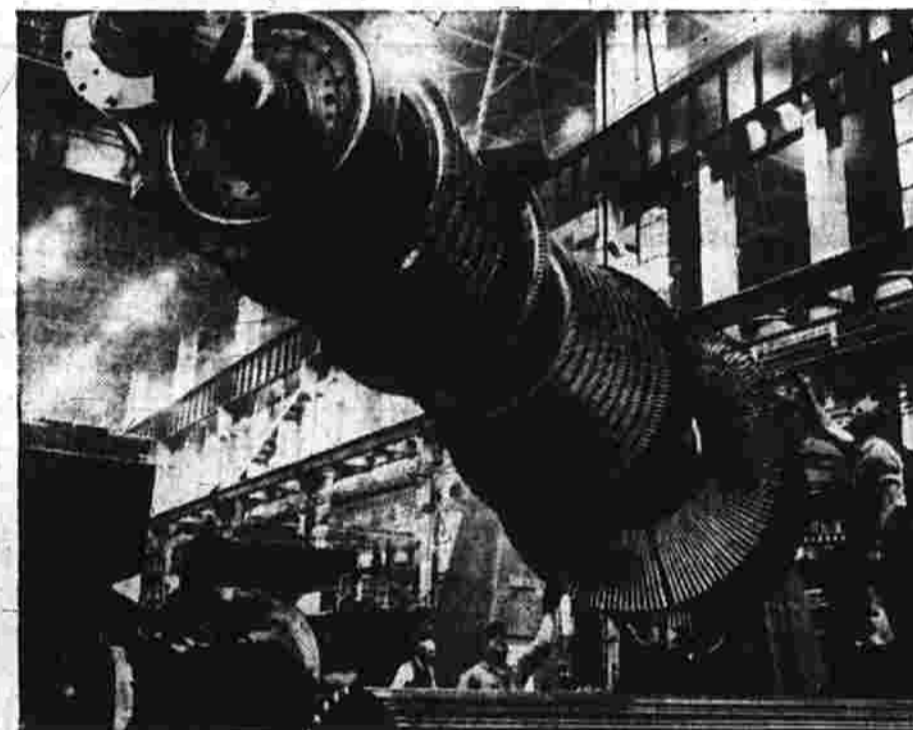

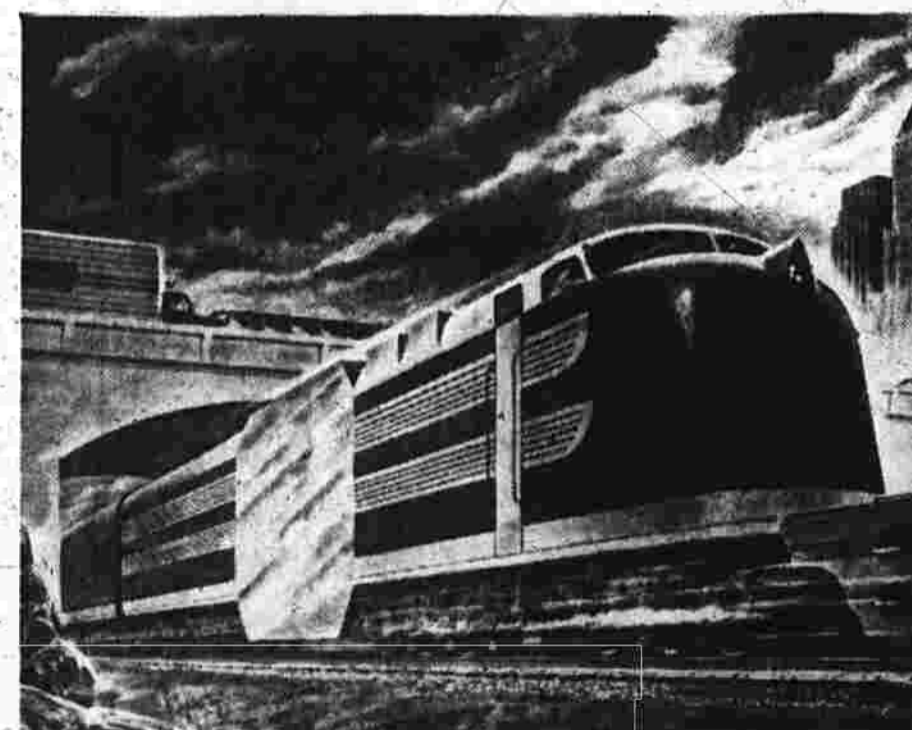

New York, June 17 (AP)—Ezzard Charles built the explosive power of his youth into Rocky Marciano and a 45-year-old fighter who is anxious to become the first ex-heavyweight champion to regain boxing's most prized prize, Charles is the only one who has done so.

IT'S NOW OR NEVER for Ezzard Charles, said Co-Manager Tom Tamm. "He knows it's his last chance and he never been so determined before. He's right on edge. I hope we don't get any rain to spoil it."

The forecast is for fair and warm weather, although an earlier prediction by the weatherman called for a threat of late evening thunder showers. But possible postponement which would start a week's setback of the 15-round title fight in Yankee Stadium was uppermost in the minds of the principals and promoters as a 15-round fight was planned before the ring to keep the canvas dry.
