Churchill Sees Ike in Move To End Misunderstanding

Washington, June 25 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill met with President Eisenhower today to see whether they can wipe out in any way the "misunderstanding" as Churchill put it, between the two major powers of the anti-Communist world.

Churchill appeared to be in buoyant spirits on his arrival by air in Washington after a flight of 24 hours from London. He met with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles in an effort to resolve British-American differences in a weekend at the White House.

On the American side, there was an absence of any public expression of confidence and hope about the talks such as was shown in London. It contained no mention of the security of the United States and Britain may have those in the Communist world are "even great."

Churchill's arrival in Washington was greeted by a large crowd of about 2,500 persons. The Indian Communist party President Jawahar Lal Nehru was also in the city.

Observers here predicted Chou would wage a strong campaign to pull Nehru further from neutrality into the "Asia for Asians" circle he called for at Geneva.

As the crowd gathered at the airport, Chou made a speech in which he said that the Chinese people would be carrying the ball in the talks.

Board Requests \$1,651 Hike For Pupils' Transportation

Transportation costs for the elementary and secondary school pupils will amount to \$1,651 more during the year 1954-55 than it did this year, if the recommendations of the Board of Education, made last night during their budget meeting are accepted.

The requested increase involves elementary school transportation only, and is a direct outgrowth of the contemplated increase of enrollment next year. There will be some 332 pupils at the school as opposed to 301 who were in the past this year.

Board member Howard Jensen expressed the transportation cost per pupil at \$27.33. This figure was multiplied times the expected number of pupils to arrive at a figure of \$3,900.

High School Cost Same The High School transportation and secondary school problem is expected from the increase in the number of students in the high school. The Winthrop High School, the Board recommended that some \$2,000 additional, or 10 percent, be added to the budget appropriation.

Reuben explained that in the past from three to five more students enrolled in high school than were included in the budget. The total cost for tuition students based on the request would be \$22,900.

During the discussion of capital equipment, George Grant, superintendent, asked the question of continuing the school basement for class use was broached.

The board read off a list of recommendations which would be needed to make the new school building a reality. They included: the kitchen, shelving and electrical outfit.

Reuben explained that the school was used two years ago, would be used this coming year and would probably have to be used indefinitely. A 4-room addition was made to the school. His belief was based on the minimum projected enrollment estimates.

Capital Outlay Items Void Capital outlay items void included playground side for about \$275; monograph for \$60; new movie screen, \$24; monograph, to be obtained through special arrangements; two bulletin boards, \$25 each; blackboard, \$25; and a transparent globe of the world, \$25.

Other items considered included a paved area for recreation, expansion of the school parking area, and drainage work around the school.

The recreation area proposal was tabled and the parking area was to be taken up with the selection. The board believed the job of adding to the parking facilities could be more economically handled if the town made the arrangements than if the board did. However, the board expected to pay for the area out of the school budget.

Auxiliary items on the budget approved last night include: Library salary, \$450; books, \$250; health services, salary of nurse \$1,100; salary of dental \$300; health supplies \$3,000; hot lunch, \$30; attendance and enumeration, \$150.

Fixed charges recommended included insurance for building, \$2-

liability insurance, \$78 and insurance, \$175.

Mrs. Jewel was asked to investigate the nature of theft and burglary insurance coverage for the school.

Board Seen in Red Norman Press, treasurer of the board, indicated last night that he expected the board would be some \$2,000 in the red for this year's budget.

For this reason the question of purchasing a two-well sink and a hot water heater, costing \$250 and \$250 respectively, as approved on the 1953-54 budget, was frozen. However, it was decided to go ahead with the purchases and wait future developments.

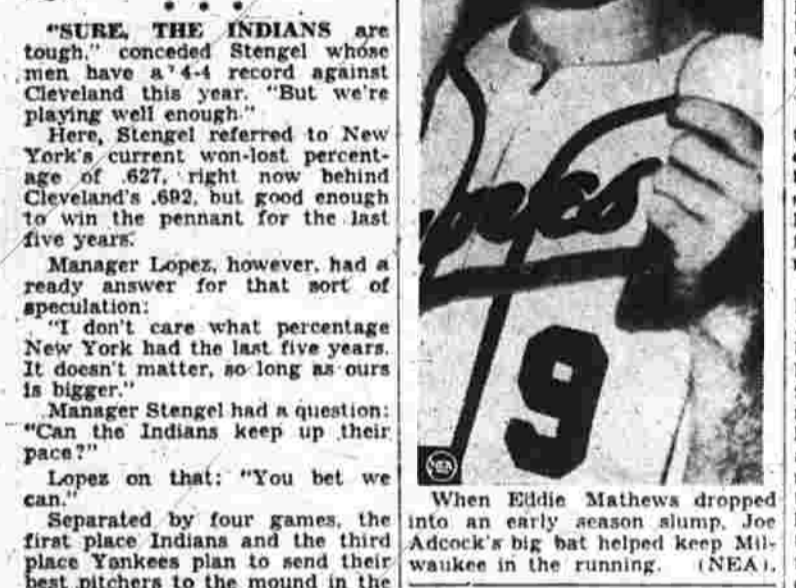

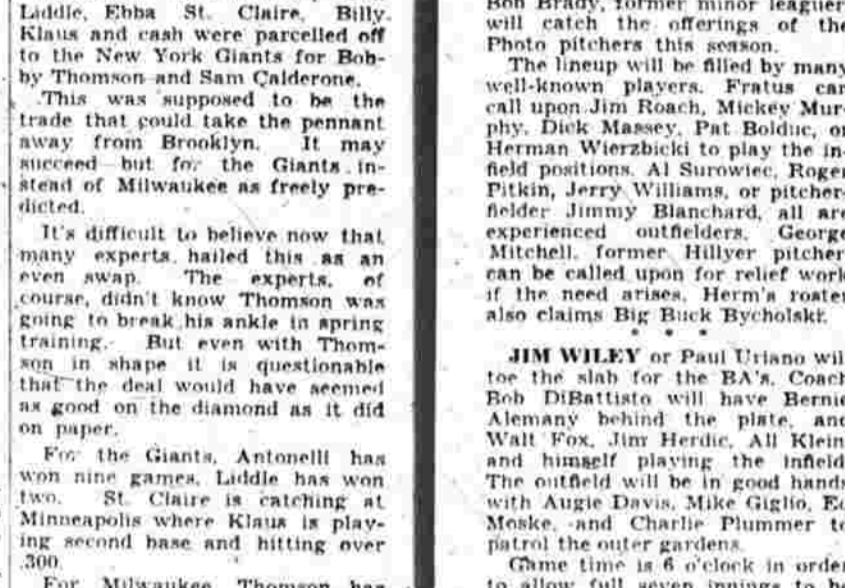

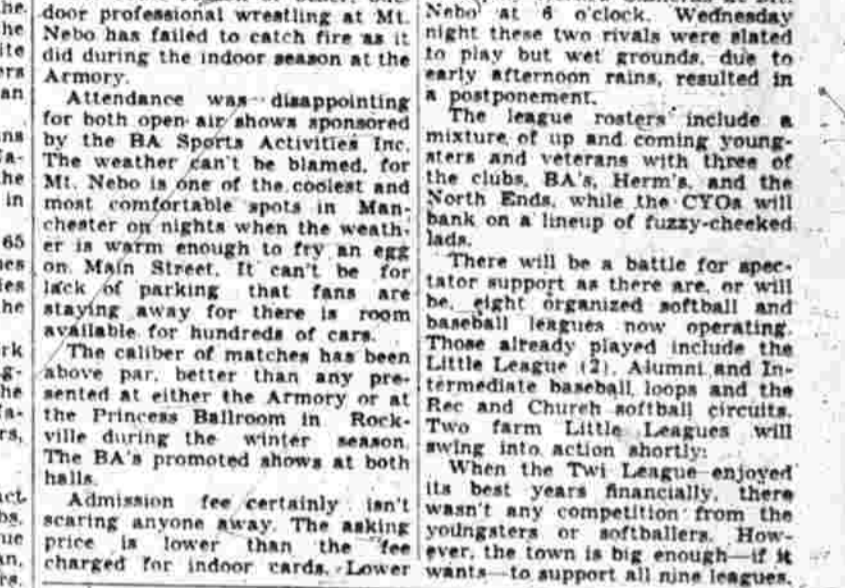
