## Guatemalan Rivals Haggle over Peace

### Junta Head And Armas Renew Talk

San Salvador, El Salvador, July 1 (AP)—Guatemala's rival anti-Communist chieftains haggled until nearly dawn today in a vain effort to agree on a peace settlement, which would give their war-torn land its fourth government in a week.

After about six hours of rest, they started talking again in an effort to reach a settlement.

The peace talks between rebel Col. Carlos Castillo Armas and Col. Eliezer Monzon, head of Guatemala's new government, broke up at 3:35 a. m. Castillo Armas announced he was returning to his rebel headquarters at Chiquimula.

In a statement issued to newsmen, both leaders said the talks, extending until 8 a. m. tomorrow, the cease-fire in effect between the rebels and the Guatemalan army.

El Salvador's President Oscar Pruno, acting as mediator, voiced optimism that a settlement could be reached.

But real peace seemed remote as Monzon's junta rushed troops to Communist strong points in Guatemala where villagers, Red leaders were reported trying to foment peasant uprisings. Red-indoctrinated farm workers were said to be inciting revolt in Escuintla, Patulul and Concepcion hotbeds of Communism about 30 miles from Guatemala City.

Monzon declined to say whether he was returning to the Guatemalan capital, but it was believed generally he would.

The joint statement said the cease-fire had been extended in order to give both parties time to consider and study various proposals to reach an accord.

Neither side would disclose what proposals were involved nor what particular point caused disagreement.

## Knowland Set To Oppose UN Red China Seat

Washington, July 1 (AP)—Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) said today that if the Chinese Communists are admitted to the United Nations he will resign as majority leader of the Senate and "devote my full efforts . . . to terminate United States membership in that organization."

Knowland told the Senate today there is likely to be "a Communist victory in Indochina as a result of that he expects a concerted effort later this year to bring Red China into the U.N. through action by the General Assembly.

"On the day that Communist China is voted into membership in the United Nations I shall resign my majority leadership in the Senate so that without embarrassment to any of my colleagues or to the administration, I can devote my full efforts in the Senate and throughout the country to terminate United States membership in that organization and our financial support of it," Knowland declared.

"My conscience would not permit me to remain silent or inactive if this last grand appeasement takes place."

Knowland, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, has urged that the United States, take the initiative with or without Great Britain, in moving to stem the tide of Communist aggression in Asia.

The California Senator told his colleagues that he would resign today, ally, France, in a thinly disguised surrender, is being required.

## Rio Flood Toll 55, Expected to Soar

Eagle Pass, Tex., July 1 (AP)—At least 55 persons are dead in the Rio Grande's most devastating flood in history, but the death toll might rise to disaster proportions today.

Across the river from here, at miserable Piedras Negras, Mexico, it was feared hundreds may have died in the collapsed adobe (mud and straw) huts of the poor.

Of the counted dead, 38 were at Piedras Negras. Nearly 100 miles north of the river, at Ozona, Tex., one of the flash floods which fed Rio Grande's swollen stream Monday killed at least 18 others. Another died in a Pecos River flood.

### Warnings Paid Off

Upstream at Del Rio, Tex., and Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, and downstream at Laredo, Tex., and Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, there were few casualties and no deaths from the unprecedented flood. Adequate warnings and other safeguards plus organization paid off, officials said.

Large numbers of sick and injured were making their way toward makeshift hospitals last night in Piedras Negras. Sixty-five injured were in a temporary medical shelter, and more moved in every minute.

Receding flood waters today showed that three spans of the international highway bridge at Laredo were washed out completely. It's the main connection on the Pan-American Highway down into Mexico. The river crested yesterday at 62.27 feet at Laredo—10 feet above the previous record crest of September, 1932. The railroad bridge was washed away, too.

At least 15,000 were homeless and some 7,000 refugees huddled in the hills of Coahuila with no shelter, no food and no water. About 80 per cent of the homes in

## General Fund Surplus Seen At Six Million

Hartford, July 1 (AP)—Connecticut embarks today on a new fiscal year, the second half of the biennial budget period, and estimates are that there is a surplus in the general fund running anywhere from \$6,000,000 to \$10,000,000.

Not until accounts for the 1953-54 fiscal year are closed two months hence will the exact amount of surplus be known, but state fiscal officials say the books show here, black ink than in a long time.

This comes about because the 1953 legislature, to balance the budget, increased the sales tax from two per cent to three per cent, and made corresponding increases in business taxes.

The Republican-controlled legislature said its aim was to balance the budget, not build up a surplus, and administration fiscal officials said yesterday that "income" may not exceed outgo during the fiscal year, just beginning as it has during the past year.

Tax revenues, reflecting a business recession, are beginning to decrease, they say, while costs are going up, and so in the state payroll for a variety of reasons including the establishment of the 50-hour week in state institutions and a need for more employees in the Welfare and Highway Dept. and in the Employment, Compensation Division of the Labor Dept.

However, the fiscal predictions are that, barring unforeseen developments, the state need not worry about deficit when the budget period closes a year from now and that the present tax structure will

## WE Strike Perils U.S. Phone Net

New York, July 1 (AP)—Some 17,000 CIO telephone equipment installers struck the Western Electric Co. at 6 a. m. (EDT) today, touching off a walkout which could cripple the nation's telephone system.

A union spokesman announced shortly after 6 a. m. "the strike is on."

Joseph Dunne, director of District 10, CIO Communications Workers of America, announced earlier that the strike would start as scheduled after talks broke down between company and union spokesmen.

The breakup of the negotiation meeting dashed hopes of a last-minute settlement when Western Electric raised its wage offer.

"The public will get under way today. This would leave other telephone workers free to continue work."

A local official announced the walkout would take effect in New York City until 11 a. m. (EDT). He said he was busy setting up strike machinery, and expressed doubt there would be any picketing today.

Meanwhile, about 100 members of District 10 went to work as usual in the long lines building of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. nerve center of national long-distance communications, a company spokesman reported.

In Cleveland, Western Electric said apparently none of the 800 installers in Ohio had gone on strike immediately.

## Mrs. Roosevelt Drops Planned Visit to Russia

New York, July 1 (AP)—Within hours of scheduled departure time Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt canceled plans today for a trip to Russia, because Soviet officials had withdrawn a visa for a trained nurseman or Russian speaking writer to accompany her.

At a news conference in the office of Look Magazine for which she was to make the trip to write up her observations, the widow of the former President suggested perhaps the Soviet Union was trying to force her to go on its terms or "mistrustful" by, she said, withdrawing the visa.

In an event she said this month she was the only time she had available for the month-long trip so she was canceling her plans. She was scheduled to leave at 4 p. m.

Reading from a prepared statement Mrs. Roosevelt said visas had been granted her and her secretary, Miss Patricia Baillargeon, but that an application for William J. Patrick, Paris editor of Look, had been "completely ignored."

A subsequent request also was ignored.

## Senate Votes House Fight Raging On Ike Farm Props

Washington, July 1 (AP)—Ary chance for a general income tax cut in the big tax revision bill appeared dead today after rival Democratic and Republican proposals both were beaten in a row of political maneuvering.

The twin defeats assured the Eisenhower administration of one of its biggest victories of the 1954 Congressional session—victorious of the tax bill just about as it was recommended to the Capitol.

Senate passage may come late today after numerous minor amendments have been considered. The measure then will go to conference with the House which has already passed the bill in somewhat different form.

Democrats professed to be not unhappy over the outcome of yesterday's rapid-fire moves over farm income tax cuts. They said failure to write some general benefits for the average taxpayer into the bill would give them a sure-fire issue to take into the November congressional elections campaign.

Blame Democrats. Republicans disputed this, contending yesterday's record would show they had offered a practical tax reduction plan that Democrats blocked it.

Leaders on both sides agreed there was practically no chance any new income tax cut plan would be offered.

The principal fight yesterday centered on a proposal of Sen. George D. Nye (D-Ore.) to write a \$2,400-per-year annual income tax cut into the bill by raising personal exemptions \$100.

Several Republican Senators had indicated they might go along on this. So long as the bill was reduced in the House, a floor manager for the measure, (Continued on Page Seventeen)

## U. S. Steel Cost Up \$3 Per Ton After Pay Hike

Pittsburgh, July 1 (AP)—U. S. Steel Corp., which produces more than one-third of the nation's steel, today announced an increase in prices averaging \$3 a ton. The present price of basic carbon steel is \$128 a ton. The new figure is a 2 1/2 per cent boost.

The price increase comes just two days after the nation's No. 1 producer signed a contract with the CIO United Steelworkers giving 190,000 employees a 15-cent hourly wage hike and improved pension and insurance programs.

Other basic steel producers are expected to follow U.S. Steel's example in raising prices since they also reached agreement with the union on similar contracts.

The company did not say immediately when the increases will become effective.

Only yesterday Benjamin Fairman, chairman of U. S. Steel, said the increases are necessary because of the new USW contract.

Union officials estimated that the improved pension and insurance programs will cost the company seven cents an hour and bring the total package to 12 cents. The company would not comment on the total cost.

## Pull Troops From Vital Battle Zone

Singapore, July 1 (AP)—Much of the Red River delta, key prize in the bitter Indochina war, was falling into the hands of the Communist-led Vietminh tonight without a fight.

French Union forces were evacuating swiftly from their hard-to-hold centers in the delta area. The end to the savage eight-year-old struggle appeared to be not far off.

The French Union forces were generally withdrawing to their last lone lifeline—the railway and highway linking the war center of Hanoi with the seaport of Haiphong, 64 miles to the east.

Last beachhead. An Indochina Dunkerque may come soon at the end of this road—the most dangerous road in the world. Haiphong is France's last beachhead in northern Viet Nam. It is from there that they will have to make the attempt to evacuate tens of thousands of troops, whether and a cease-fire or after fighting their way through from Hanoi.

The French command today announced they were pulling out of such important and heavily populated centers as Binh Dien, that Binh Nam Dinh and Ninh Binh, all within 55 to 75 miles south and southeast of Hanoi.

Four Million People. That automatic Franco-American area embracing thousands of villages peopled by around four million Vietnamese were dropping into the hands of the troops of Vietminh Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap.

It also meant that while those millions were being abandoned to Communism, the French soon would be shakily controlling only the lifeline between Hanoi and Haiphong and a strip of territory in northeastern Indochina including the town of Moncaoy on the Chinese border.

That too, however, may soon be given up as the French concentrate all their defensive power in the door-die sector between Hanoi and Haiphong.

Barring a cease-fire, the Vietminh are expected quickly to hit the lifeline with a massive human sea attack that could crush the French Union forces.

Whether the delta then is swept by monsoon rains will make little difference.

The Vietminh usually have stepped their heaviest attacks during rainstorms because they immobilize French armor and warplanes.

### Hebron Letters of Eccentric Pair Given to Hebron Library

**By SUSAN PENDELTON**  
Charles C. Sellers, former Hebron resident, now of the faculty of Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., has given to the Douglas Library of Hebron two original letters from Lorenzo Dow, famous and eccentric preacher, which were inventoried by Dr. Ulysses Dow, Lorenzo's youngest son, and a group of old newspapers containing accounts of Lorenzo Dow's wanderings and strange goings.

The earlier of the Lorenzo Dow letters is dated Nov. 4, 1825, from Philadelphia, "next door to the sign of the Bear at Benedict Dorsey's."

George Dolbearre, arrested Dorsey, who owned a china shop, was an odd fish himself. The letter concerns George Dolbearre of Montville, a relative of Dow's second wife, Lucy, having just arrived in Philadelphia with news that George had been arrested for some offense.

Lorenzo sat down at once and scrawled out this letter to the Law, a New London lawyer.

The second letter is a short one, addressed to Edward Huntington, and also on a legal matter. Lorenzo in his last years was constantly embroiled in law suits. Here, on March 22, 1825, Lorenzo promises to be in New York and Philadelphia in two or three weeks, and complains of being "very well," a fact borne out by the very handwriting.

It was the last year of his life. The above papers were collected by Sellers while working on his biography of Lorenzo Dow, a copy of which is in the Douglas Library.

Letter reproduced  
The conduct of Dr. Dolbearre appears to me unparalleled. George Dolbearre has no claim on me by note or bond—he has made a great deal of trouble for me—and I wish the poor fellow away from the frog drinkers of Montville.

With you would write me immediately on the reception of this whether George will be detained there till spring. If you get him clear which you would let him have about six dollars to bring him on to this place or what is necessary I give him direction where to call at.

Lorenzo Dow  
N. B. you may show this to the Judge if you get it in time & think it best—as it is strange to me my wife tells me that they wanted to summon me as an evidence. I do not believe George could do it unless he goes.

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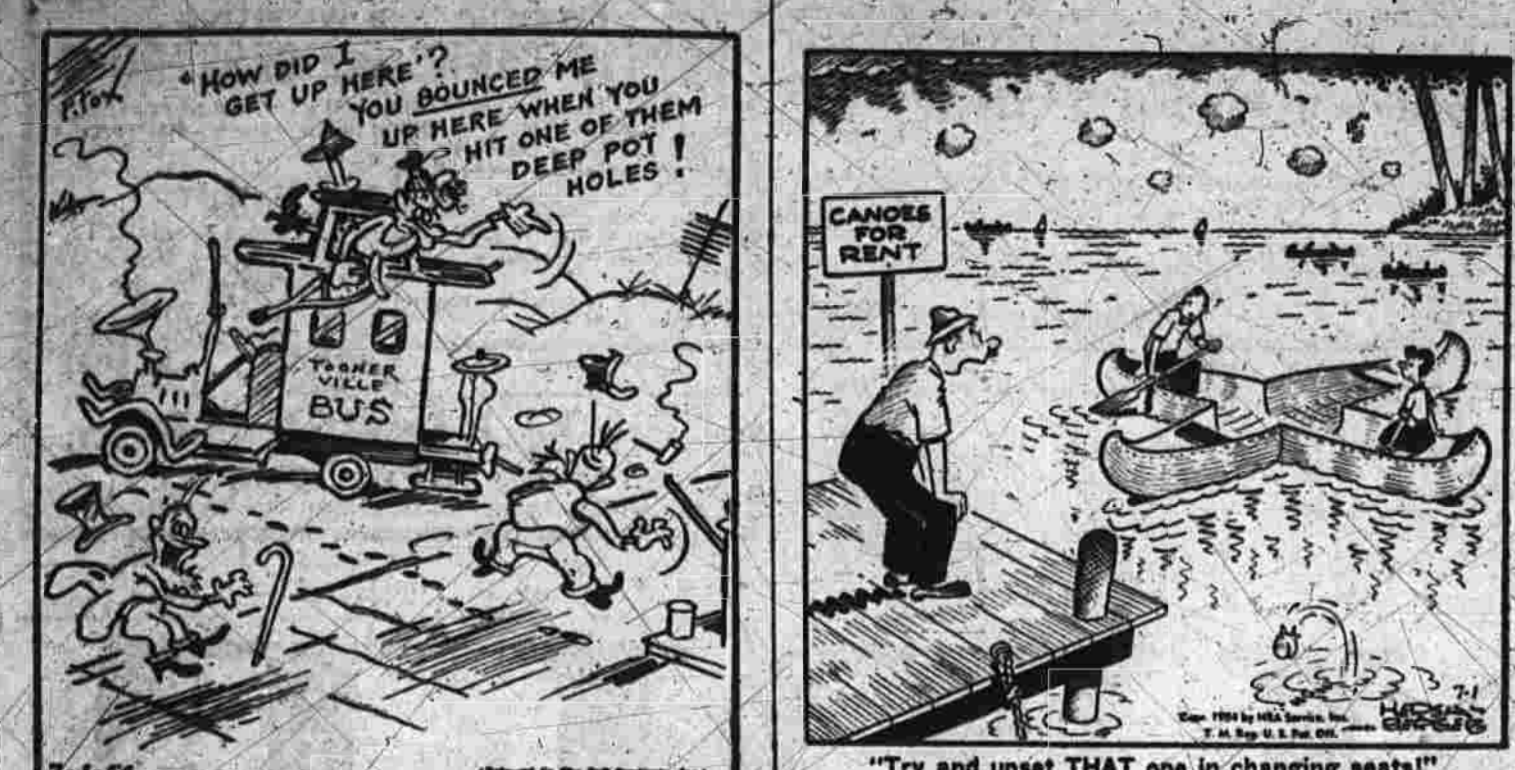

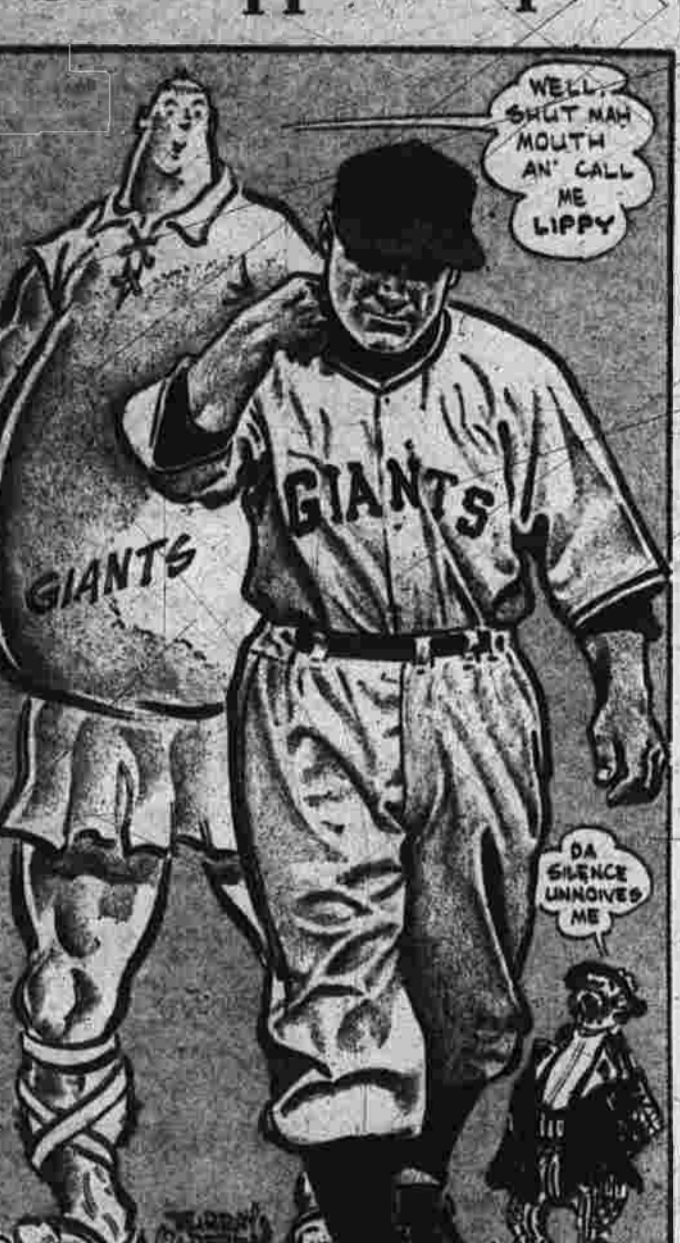

## Senator Butler Of Nebraska Passes at 76

Washington, July 2 (AP)—Republican Sen. Hugh Butler of Nebraska died at the age of 76 last night, the fourth U.S. Senator and the second from his state to succumb this year.

Butler, who had been elected to his third six-year term two years ago, suffered a stroke Wednesday night. He was taken to the City Hospital at nearby Bethesda, Md., yesterday morning and died there about 11:30 p. m. (EDT) last night.
