been devised. By using the new antibiotics i has become possible to save many people with osteomyelitis from nonths or even years of hospital sation and repeated surgery. Like so many other diseas early treatment is of the utmos nportance. Surgery is still necessary for some and the disease m drag on with discouraging pe sistance or flare up without apparent reason.
