outside the walls and the women's section were not affected. The prison kitchen was closed when the men refused to eat the evening meal.

Several reasons were advanced for the strike but Cranor said the principal one was idleness.

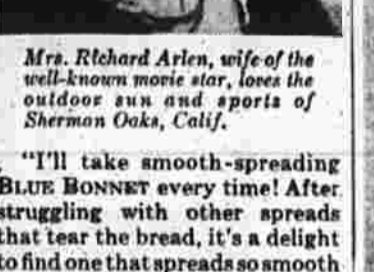
"Only 62 per cent of the inmates are employed and those who are doing a lot of bedding," Cranor said. He said more than 500 were unemployed before the strike.

The warden said other complaints ranged from the food, which he said a state food consultant after a check last week had called "good and well served," to actions of the State Board of Prison Terms and Paroles.

And Delmore and Dr. Henry Nease, chairman of the prison board, said some of the men may be protesting the impending change of warden.

It was the second outbreak of trouble at the penitentiary in 11 months. Hundreds of inmates broke windows and furniture after a half million dollar fire in the metals plant Sept. 10, 1953. Guards with tear gas, broke up the riot.

Deaths Last Night

Chicago, July 28 (AP)—Reports from Washington indicate that the former Nazis will now claim that those Germans who were against Hitler were always Communists at heart, which, in turn, would justify Hitler's own being and career.

But his major verdict, that the policy of the West and the status of Formosa, or until some change is made in American policy, or until Chiang Kai-shek grows old and feeble.

But as the situation stands at the moment, the Chinese civil war is still on, and we are participating in it. We are participating in it by our understood guarantee to protect Chiang Kai-shek against Communist invasion.

Formosa, from the mainland, we are participating in it by our supply of money, arms, and planes to Chiang Kai-shek.

There is not a great deal of action in this continuation of the Chinese civil war. Mainly, it consists of Formosa raids on shipping heading toward Communist China, and of occasional forays by Formosa planes over the Chinese coast.

But enough of this is being done, using planes supplied by us, to give the Chinese Communists the excuse they need when they shoot down the British commercial plane—the excuse that they thought it was a plane from Formosa.

Our supplying of military aid to Chiang Kai-shek is legitimate, no longer as we recognize his government as the only Chinese government in the world. And it is one of the great reasons for refusing to recognize Communist China that such recognition would end our legal right to do what we are doing now, which is to play a part in the desperate tag end of the Chinese civil war.

So far as Communist China is concerned, our role with regard to Formosa is that we concede to one side of the Chinese civil war the right to fight, and help it to do so, but deny the right to fight to the other side. And we make no distinction in Korea, and have agreed to tolerate peace in Indo-China, but do not accept the idea of any settlement of the Formosan situation.

The reason we do nothing different from what we are doing now is that we do not know how to. Wisely, or unwisely, our national policy has made championing of Chiang Kai-shek a hard and fast rule. Politically speaking, we would not know how to retreat from this policy even if we wanted to. Yet there is no valid indication that our support of Chiang Kai-shek is ever anywhere. Not even his most fervent champions really believe he is going to conquer the mainland again. He is not going anywhere, and yet we do not know how to cease our own military support of him, which would mean that the situation is going to keep on festering for some time to come.

mid-morning as it came in for a landing at Qui Dien. Fifty minutes later a single mortar shell hit the landing strip.

Previous reports that the Viet-minh had continued attacking the Qui Dien post for several hours after the cease-fire were exaggerated... He added that a Viet-minh ambush of a road-opening patrol, reported previously as occurring after the truce hour, actually had taken place before.

But on the political front the cease-fire was the signal for renewed feuding between rival anti-Communist factions in both North and South Viet Nam.

In Hanoi, Vietnamese officials who were locked in a struggle with a French official said was endangering the evacuation of Vietnamese civilians before the Communists take over the city 79 days hence.

Observers in Saigon were certain that the evacuation be an all-Vietnamese show. Since the Vietnamese have neither ships nor planes, the French were at a loss to see how the native government could bring off the evacuation without French aid.

one billion dollars a year. The House vote passed a trimmed-down version permitting taxpayers to deduct from their income tax returns \$50 in dividends the first year and \$100 the second year. The House bill also would have permitted taxpayers to subtract 3 per cent of their remaining dividend income the first year—10 per cent the second year—from the tax payment they otherwise would make.

The House bill would have cut taxes on dividends by about 200 million dollars the first year and eventually up to \$60 million dollars a year.

The Senate knocked out all but the \$50 exclusion, a tax reduction of only 46 millions a year.

Other major provisions in the compromise version would also take on dividends an estimated 204 millions the first year, 362 millions in later years.

Depreciation—Business firms could get much more rapid tax deductions for depreciation of new plants and equipment: 323 million the first year, much more over the next few years.

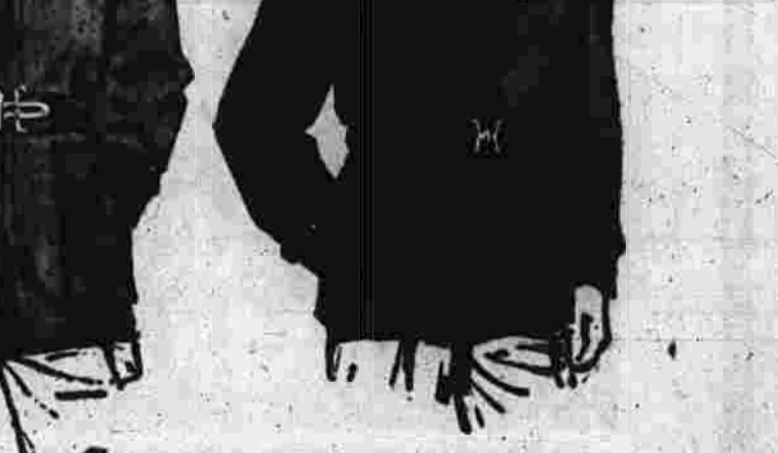

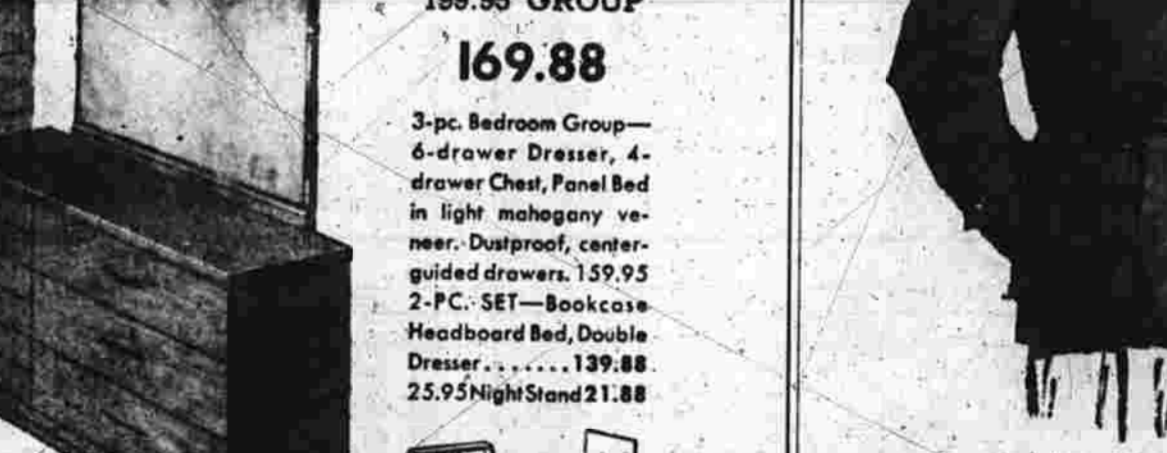
