Aussies Back Asia Alliance

Canberra, Australia, Aug. 5 (AP)—Prime Minister Robert Menzies committed Australia tonight to give military support to the proposed Southeast Asia Defense Alliance—SEATO. In so doing Menzies broke with historic Australian tradition that such commitments are not made in advance but determined by Parliament after a war starts. "We cannot merely profess our principles of foreign policy," Menzies said, "and refuse to support them with arms, ships, instruments of war and supplies, as we in turn would wish them to support ours."

Red Chinese Refuse Second U. S. Protest

London, Aug. 5 (AP)—Red China has refused even to accept a second American protest against the shooting down of a British airliner off Hainan last month, diplomatic officials said today. Three Americans were among 10 persons killed in the attack. In Washington, the State Dept. said that Britain has notified the department that it has decided to accept the American protest. Refusal to accept it would amount to rejection of the department's decision to proceed to comment later on the Red Chinese attitude.

Russian Parley Plea Aims at West Defense

Washington, Aug. 5 (AP)—Russia's new proposal for a European security pact is being regarded here as part of a persistent drive to wreck western anti-Communist defense and to bring about a new leadership of the free world. Officials said today that Britain and the United States in opposition to this Russian proposal. Iran, West Firms Sign Pact on Oil Field Use

Tehran, Iran, Aug. 5 (AP)—Representatives of eight big Western oil companies and the Iranian government announced broad agreement today to restrict Iran's frozen oil industry. They said they hoped to begin shipping at least some of the oil again in about two months. Under the agreement announced simultaneously in Tehran and London, the eight companies as a consortium will contribute to the state refinery and the surrounding oil fields. The agreement also provides for Iran and will stipulate that the U. S. oil companies had participated in the three-year settlement of the Iranian agreement with the U. S. and Britain.

Red Subs Pose Threat To U. S. Pacific Routes

Tokyo, Aug. 5 (AP)—The Russian Navy may have as many as 90 submarines in the Pacific area, according to a report by the commander of U. S. Naval Forces in the Far East, estimated today. "These submarines definitely would be a threat to maintaining sea lines of communication," said the report. "They are in an interview, and we feel it would be reasonable to expect that one-quarter of them are in the Pacific."

Christen had previously served as terms in the House, 1935-47. Case, 57, has been in the Senate since 1948. Previously he had served 12 years in the House where he was a member of the American Activities Committee. Case is a rancher and former newspaper editor and publisher.

Vice President Nixon made the announcement of appointment of the committee in a quiet, matter-of-fact voice, after calling a group of members to the chamber.

Behind-the-scenes maneuvers to line it up had been going on steadily since the Senate voted Monday night to create the committee.

The vote ended a bitter debate in the Senate touched off by a resolution by Sen. Fulbright (D-Ark.) calling for censure of McCarthy.

Ask For Report Now  
The motion for creation of the committee, offered by GOP leader Knowland, includes a provision that the committee should report before the session, Congress adjourns.

There appears to be a strong possibility, however, that any report by that time—since congressional leaders say driving for a report by next weekend—could not be made.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), speaking from his own experience of presiding over the McCarthy Army hearings, told reporters his guess was that the new inquiry could last two or three months.

He said he thought that much time would be needed unless the committee limited the number of witnesses to be heard. And he advised against that.

Mundt said, however, that this would be time well spent if we could dispose of all of these charges one way or the other and put the action behind us so the Senate could go on to more important business.

Sen. McClellan of Arkansas, senior Democrat on the investigations subcommittee, shared this general view. He said that subcommittee's report on the McCarthy Army row ought to be made before mid-September and the Senate should stay around at the end of the session.

"I think the whole McCarthy controversy—both the McCarthy Army hearings and the censure charges—should be disposed of before the Senate adjourns," he declared.

The Town Planning Commission expects to ask the Board of Directors for money from the parking-meter fund to finance further studies of its master plan for parking and traffic circulation in the Main Street business area, it was reliably reported today.
