To Borrow \$3,000,000 In Anticipation Of Taxes, Refund Debt

The Board of Directors last night took several actions affecting town finances and town-owned real estate.

To separate accounts the Board authorized the borrowing of \$3,000,000 in anticipation of taxes, refund debt.

Maloney said the town pays an interest on the borrowing.

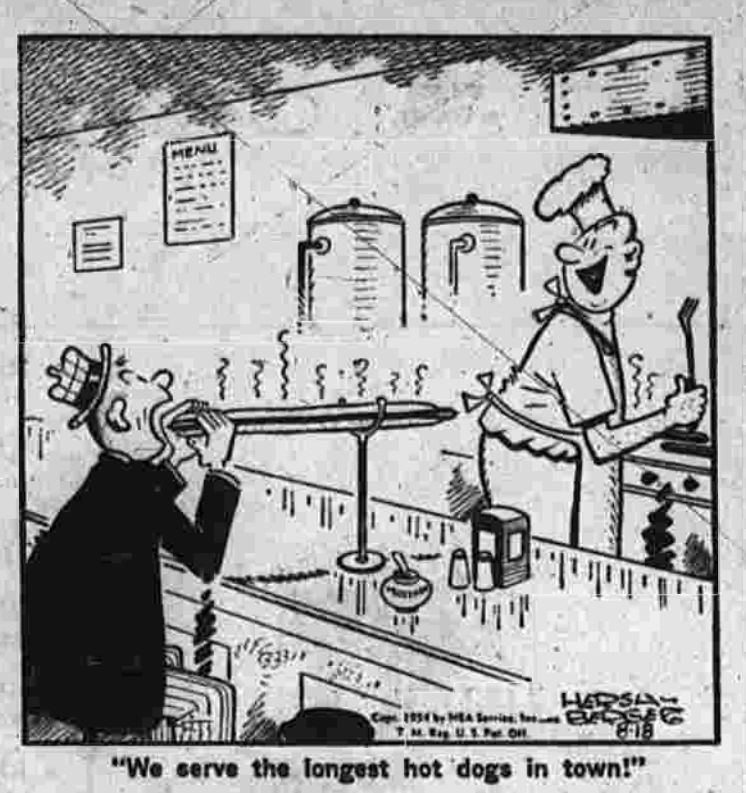
