CDU Minister President Friedrich Wilhelm Lübke, whose forces have 22 seats, lost 1950 in a new government under his command. The Free Democrats already have 19 seats.

The Socialists had success yesterday, but our government formation was confirmed with a small majority.

Until the final seat distribution was announced, coalition spokesmen indicated that the CDU would form their own coalition government in Schleswig-Holstein.

With both the Refugee Party and the Free Democrats in its coalition, the CDU would muster 40 of the 60 seats compared to 25.

Bray said the plane had left Westover a few days ago and was on a regularly scheduled flight out of Thule when its commander declared a "state of emergency" 12 minutes after becoming airborne.

Bray said he does not know what caused the plane's crash but he said a C-119 carrying medical supplies left Westover Tuesday for Thule—a 14-hour flight—55 miles after the crash.

Bray said it was the first fatal accident in more than 4,000 flights made by the Atlantic Division MATS to Thule since the North Pole, Greenland, and Iceland routes were opened in 1951.

More than 35,000 passengers and cargo have been transported.

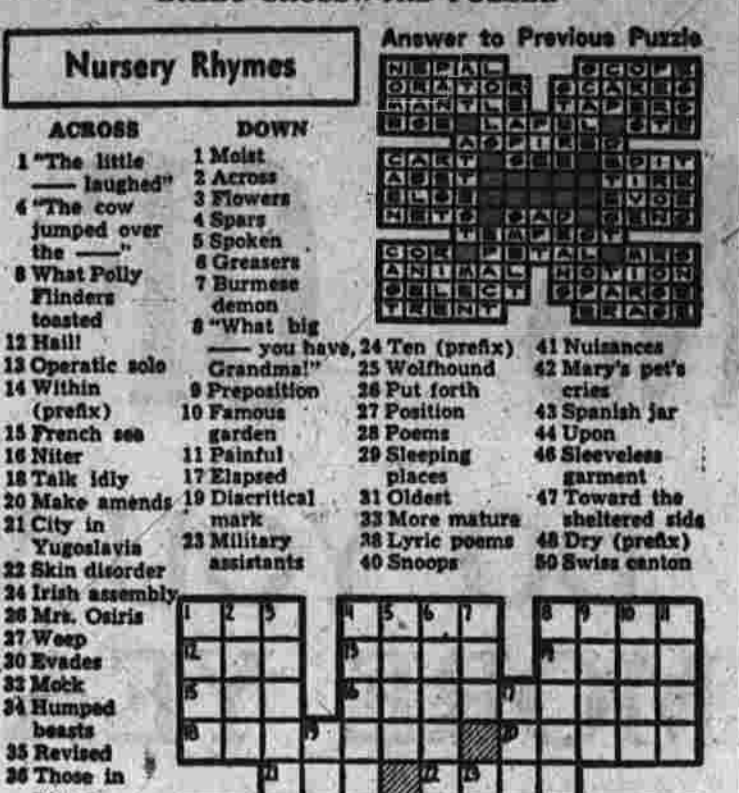

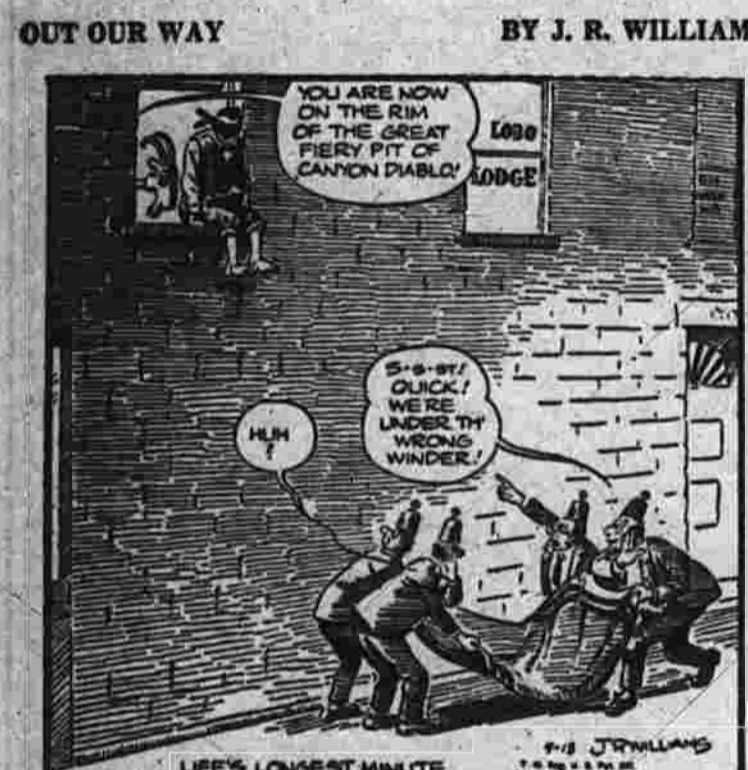

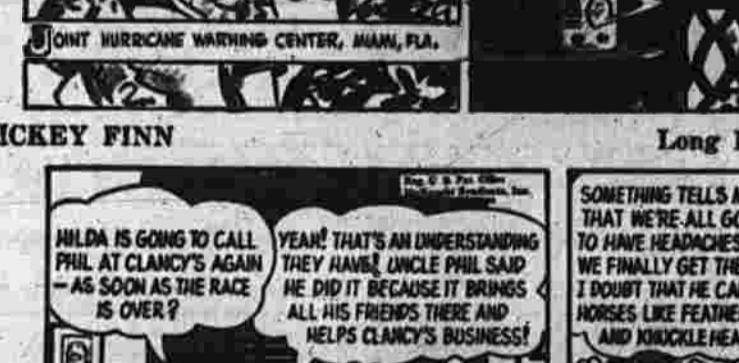
