where it would hurt neither defense nor the economy.
And W. J. McNell, assistant secretary of defense and chief fiscal officer of the Pentagon, told news-men that despite the new reduction in defense spending, industry would get about twice the volume of defense contracts this year that it received last year. This action, by putting an increased flow of defense contracts in the pipeline, would tend to spur production and employment.

Defense Status Unchanged
Secretary Humphrey said, "We are seeking more defense for less money, rather than changing the state of our defense."
Total "major national security program" outlays—including direct military spending, military aid to allies, atomic energy activities and stockpiling of strategic materials—will be \$41,960,000,000 this year instead of \$44,860,000,000 programmed last January. The new estimate represented a \$3,000,000,000 drop from last fiscal year and a decline of \$2,300,000,000 from peak defense outlays after the outbreak of fighting in Korea.
The revision of the January direct military spending estimates cut the biggest national security spending category down from 37½ billion dollars to 35½ billion dollars.

Army Spending Cut
"To make this cut," McNell said, "Army outlays were cut from 10.4 billion to 9.4 billion, with the biggest part of the reduction in Army procurement of ammunition, ships and boats."

Lies, and the main role was played by the U. S. A., although the frontiers of the United States are several thousand kilometers away from Southeast Asia," the statement of Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov's office continued.
Thailand, the Philippines and Indonesia, took part, was charged, because they were bound hand and foot by existing agreements with the U.S.A. for military and economic aid.
All other Asian nations have refused to join the Foreign Ministry declared, and Communist China "opposes these aggressive plans because she justly regards the above military group as a menace to her security."
The West, particularly the United States, has insistently tried to build a military organization which could serve first of all for the liquidation of national liberation movements in the countries of Southeast Asia," the statement said. It added that the Soviet government was confident the western attempt would fail.
"Just as in Europe," the statement said, "a genuine security for peoples in Southeast Asia can be safeguarded only on the basis of joint efforts of all the governments of that region independent of their social system, without dictation and interference from outside."
Comparing SEATO with NATO, the Foreign Office said both are "inherent opposition to the aims and principles of the United Nations."
The statement was the second official statement against the West in a week. Earlier the Foreign Ministry sharply denounced western efforts to find a substitute for the European Army plan after its rejection by France.

\$4,745,811 Grand List Seen By Board; Tax Rise Likely

Bolton, Sept. 15 (Special)—The Board of Finance has today announced a budget for the next fiscal year which indicates a tax rise of 21 cents will be levied. If the tax rate prediction proves accurate, it will represent an increase of two mills over the current rate.

Prediction of the \$4,745,811 grand list is based on an anticipated increase of a quarter million dollars over last year's figure. Total anticipated expenditure is \$5,023,256. This is an increase of \$1,750 over the figure presented at the public hearing last week and is represented by inclusion of a dishwasher for the school lunch program.

However, sentiment expressed at the hearing was strongly in favor of the purchase of a new washer and the group was promised it would be included in the final budget. This was done because no increase in the budget can be made when it is submitted for approval of the annual town meeting. However, the budget can be cut by vote of the meeting.

Total anticipated revenue other than that from property tax receipts estimated by the Board of Finance is \$456,600. This includes \$32,700 from state funds under aid to education and transportation grants.

Royal Consort's Job Seen One of World's Toughest

By TOM A. CULLEN
London (REAP)—Being the husband of Queen Elizabeth II is one of the world's toughest jobs. This Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, has made an outstanding success of it is a tribute to his youth, his vigor and his independence of mind.

His Status
Consider the 33-year-old duke's status as royal consort:
He is condemned to stand one pace behind his wife, yet he must appear always to be assisting her in her duties.
He must live in a glass palace, ready for rock-throwing critics.
Above all, he must keep grinning.
If he likes to drive himself in fast motor cars (as Philip does), he is accused of being reckless, a "know-nothing."
If he hob-nobs with movie stars and trade union bosses, he is being it merely for show-value, his critics say.
Yet, the Duke of Edinburgh does all these things, and, more important—he gets away with them.
Those who knew Philip from his naval cadet days at Dartmouth and his shipmates during six years of war could have foretold that he would never be content to be known as "Mister Elizabeth II."
He is too much the man to make a milquetoast. And then there is the famous Mountbatten nose which Philip inherited.
It's a long, straight nose, giving tall, blond Philip somewhat the appearance of a Norse Viking, and there's hardly a phase of British national life into which the duke hasn't plunged.
Naturally inquisitive.
The duke is as naturally inquisitive as full of ideas as he is of brains. Britain has benefited by his notions.
Take labor, for example. Recently when the duke set out to investigate the social problems connected with industry, he invited union leaders to Buckingham Palace. Immediately, a few jet-setting unions jet out yelps of protest. Industrial workers vent upon of the duke's concern, they said.
In the end they came—and they stayed to applaud. They found not only that the duke was a "right guy"—one of the bosses—but that he knew what he was talking about. For Philip it was a personal triumph.
For the past three years Philip has been hammering steadily away at one point: British industry

way, through competitive stunts, although his uncle is Admiral Earl Mountbatten ("I'll get into the Navy on my own or not at all," Philip had often said).
Kicked as Commander
Even after his marriage to Princess Elizabeth he went back to sea for nearly two years, ending his active service with the rank of commander.
Question of Survival
It is not a matter of choice, as Philip sees it. It is a question of Britain's survival.
Recently, he urged industrialists to become "brain pickers," always on the look-out for new methods and new ideas. "We are not a nation of nit-wits," he reminded the National Union of Manufacturers. "In fact, we are our greatest asset."
And so it is whenever the duke goes—gadding, prodding, administering a kick here, a pat there. He cannot all arrangements during an inspection of one of Britain's big industrial plants, because "How can I get the hang of this in such a short time?" On his inspection trip to Canada this summer, he was the first member of the ruling family to visit the Arctic Circle, source of Canada's new boom.
Can Be Tasty
The duke can be tasty. He can brush off a hobby-sewer who runs after him for his autograph with, "What do you think I am—a movie star?"
But he can also be charming. At a Washington reception an attractive woman murmured an appreciative "Mmm" as Philip, looking handsome in a naval uniform, walked past. The duke looked back with a disarming smile and said: "Mmm? Mmm?"
The secret of Philip's success, according to those close to him, is that he is a first-rate naval officer. "Britain lost a good admiral in gaining a consort," the Admiralty sea-dogs mourn.
At 18 Philip entered Dartmouth, the Annapolis of Britain, the hard

Chestnut Fights Against Blight

Pikeville Ky. (AP)—The chestnut, nearly extinct as the result of a blight, is trying a one-tree comeback here.
Before the blight struck about 25 years ago, the trees made valuable lumber and the savory nuts, encased in prickly burrs, were eagerly sought in the autumn. Apparently all the old trees are dead now, although occasionally a few branches spring from old trunks only to wither away.
But Mrs. Ben Cassidy has nursed a transplanted twig into a healthy 6-year-old chestnut sapling, filled with green burrs.
When blight struck at the sapling last year, Mrs. Cassidy placed a cube of laundry soap in its fork. The blight went away.
So far as is known, no one has used soap successfully before to stop the blight. Although Mrs. Cassidy has confidence in her remedy, foresters fear her tree will succumb later. No blight-killing properties are attributed to soap.
The blight is caused by a fungus. It attacks the bark, producing lesions that ultimately girdle and kill the tree.
