





Close Races Predicted In Bay State Elections

By RELMAN MORIN He traveled by helicopter, once Boston, Sept. 30 (A)—A tough covered 300 hiles and appeared in election battle is building up in Massachusetts and at this point it looks so close that neither party is making any confident victory

looks so close that neither party is making any confident victory predictions.

The Maine election heartened the Democrats and startled the Republicans.

Even though they interpret the Maine outcome as a sign of a "national tide" running their way, Massachusetts Democrats have been cautious in their claims for Nov. 2. Republicans, while discounting Democratic gains in Maine, are equally wary.

Maine Democrats elected a governor for the first time in 20 years. They also cut deep into traditionally wide Republicans margins in Congressional races.

Chief interest in Massachusetts centers in the races for the Governorship and a seat in the U.S. Senate. Both now are held by Republicans. The GOP has an 8-6 edge in the House of Repgesentatives. A Democratic leader would go no further than to say his party will make it 7-7 this fall.

In-the Senate race, the veteran Leverett Saltonstall is opposed by a former Democratic Congressman, Foster Furcolo, who has risen rapidly in Bay State politics since he came home from World War
