Out of A Tangle: The unhappy record of broken promises and violated pledges on the subject of Trieste has persisted to the last, even in what may be the happy solution of the problem.

The agreement by which the problem is settled is titled a "Memorandum of Understanding" and the representatives of Britain, the United States, Yugoslavia and Italy, when signing it, were careful to put down their initials and not their names.

The first indirect violation of that treaty came when Russia refused to agree on any candidate for the post of international governor of an internationalized Trieste.

The first open violation of the treaty came in 1948, when the United States, seeking to influence the elections in Italy, suddenly presented all of Trieste to Italy.

Subsequently we violated our promise to violate the treaty. That was because Yugoslavia suddenly left the company of Russia and became a country fit for our company.

Finally, a year ago, we announced that we were dividing Trieste between Italy and Yugoslavia, and withdrawing our troops immediately. That proved a little premature, but now a year's patient diplomacy has enabled us to bring it off, at last.

We are relieved and glad to be out of such a messy mess which forced us, in the pursuit of expediency, to regulate our own word so many times. It has been a humbling experience in that it has shown us how rough circumstances can be on our own pledged word.

It is good to be out of our tangled promises. And it is to be hoped that the new settlement which we still do not see as final is final because it is in violation of the international law contained in the Italian peace treaty, which we nevertheless reduce tensions and promote friendship on the shores of the Adriatic. The good point of it all is that two nations have turned away from the potential use of force as any kind of solution for a better territorial rivalry.

The Response To Vishinsky: At the United Nations General Assembly Monday, the official representatives of Britain and France made their first response to the new Russian disarmament proposal, which was really, on paper at least, Russian acceptance of a British-French proposal submitted last spring, and then rejected by Russia.

The British Minister of State, Selwyn Lloyd, expressed himself with caution, saying "it is a cause for satisfaction that after years of apparently fruitless debate the Western proposals of June 21, and Russian acceptance of them as a basis, held out the possibility of progress in this all-important field."

The sheriff said Erickson had attempted to catch Overton before he could escape and that he was shot. Overton was "carried" after Carl Gugel, Paul's brother, who had been in another room of the house when the shootings were fired, entered the room with a shotgun.
