New York (AP)—An ambitious girl doesn't merely marry a man; she marries the corporation he works for, too.

It has become a kind of 20th century buzzword.

For it is an open secret that many large corporations now don't make a man an executive solely on the basis of his work in the office.

No, indeed. "That is only half of it. The corporation spot checks his wife also to be sure that she measures up to its requirements.

This arises a strange new industrial concept—"the ideal corporate wife."

Frightens Average Wife

The idea of being courtly studied by the bifocal gaze of a huge corporation is rather frightening to the average wife.

"I think I know how to please my husband," she says, "but how does a girl go about keeping a nervous hubby?"

Suppose her husband is a Buick. She is unweary by the thought that in some mysterious way she may commit a blunder, a blunder that will not only cause her husband to lose out on a promotion to district sales manager but also cause General Motors itself to drop 30 points on the stock market. It is an awful responsibility to put on the shoulders of one frail but well-meaning woman.

Fortunately, she has some tips to guide her. But they tend only to give her a feeling of inferiority. For surveys of the "ideal corporate wife" shows that having her ears pierced, her hair styled, well-dressed and raised her hair are hardly enough.

The Doctor Says

Bunions Can Be Avoided

It is impossible to guess at the misery caused by bunions and reddened and the whole area extremely sensitive to pressure.

ALONGST ALL PEOPLE, who have bunions could have avoided them. They are usually the result of wearing improperly fitted shoes which are too narrow, too pointed or too short.

Bunions are practically unpreventable. A bunion is really a form of bursitis which develops at the

base of the big toe. The tip of the toe has been bent inward so that the joint at its base is subjected to pressure and irritation, which leads to the development of the bunion. It is a swelling of the lining of the joint and the skin over this becomes thickened and reddened and the whole area extremely sensitive to pressure.

Prevention, however, can be accomplished by careful attention to the fitting of shoes so that the angle of the toe which leads to bunion formation is avoided. Surgery may be the only answer. At times part of the difficulty is the accumulation of fluid which can be removed by a needle or small tube.

But often an operation which involves removal of the excess tissue making up the bunion is necessary. Just the right amount has to be taken out and then the bones of the big toe have to be placed in the proper position and

British Planes To Fly on U.S. Canada Routes

Toronto (VNA) — For the first time in history, British-Built commercial planes will carry passengers on North American routes this winter when Vickers Viscount turboprop aircraft begin flying between Canadian and United States cities.
 "Unless you have traveled in a turboprop airplane, or a pure jet plane, it is difficult to describe the terrific passenger appeal that this method of transportation has to offer," says Jack T. Dymally, chief engineer of the Canadian government-owned airline, Trans-Canada.
 The Canadian airline has ordered 22 of the four-engined Viscount aircraft, the first of which will start coming over from England in mid-October. The planes

will be scheduled service by Feb. 1.
 Airline Order 46 — One big United States operator—Capital Airlines—has ordered 40 of the British planes with 401 seats to come next spring. It has options on additional planes. By that time the Canadian airline will have the planes on a number of daily flights between Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg between Toronto and New York, Montreal and New York, Toronto and Chicago, and Toronto and Windsor, opposite Detroit. These routes carry the heaviest traffic between Canada and the United States.
 The Viscount aircraft has already been in use on European routes for more than a year. Other U. S. airlines besides Capital have indicated interest in the plane.

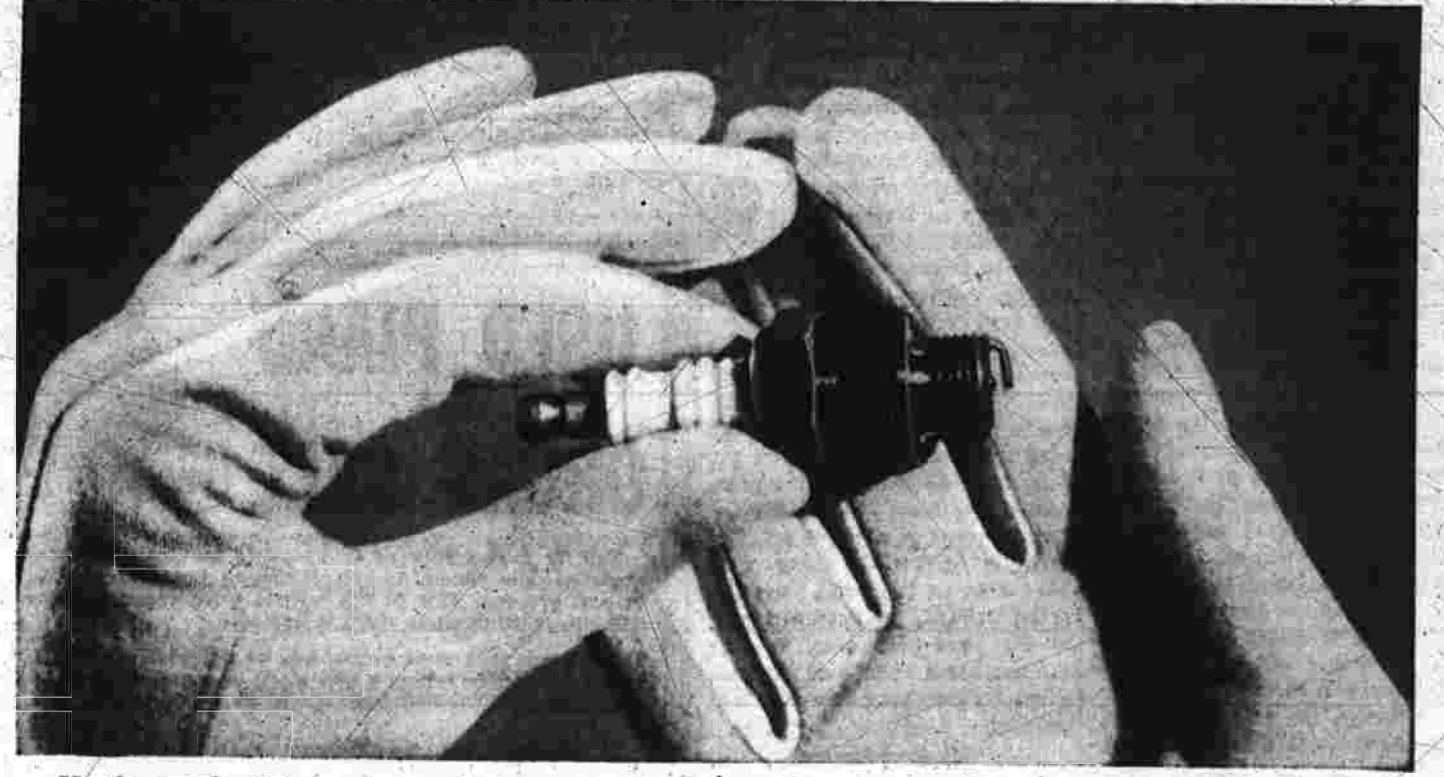

Connecticut, we suspect, rather likes to do this, by margins which are better than those of the winners when it sees its chance to do so.

At any rate, Connecticut yesterday provided its voters with a hint of a repudiation of the leadership of President Eisenhower. One of the controversial Nixon-Yates contract, to many thoughtful observers, it does not seem possible that the President could be as staunch a defender of that contract as he is. And he has become public knowledge that the one of President Eisenhower's warmest supporters and one of the congressional campaign workers of the Republican Party in Kentucky, made repeated efforts to see President Eisenhower in the White House.

It imposes unusual test upon the new Governor, and it also connotes upon his unusual opportunity. But if he pursues the highest standards he himself has enunciated in the past, he will find accomplishment possible, and bipartisan support available for that accomplishment. We congratulate him upon his opportunity and upon the clear and honorable way in which he conducted the campaign which brought him this personal victory.

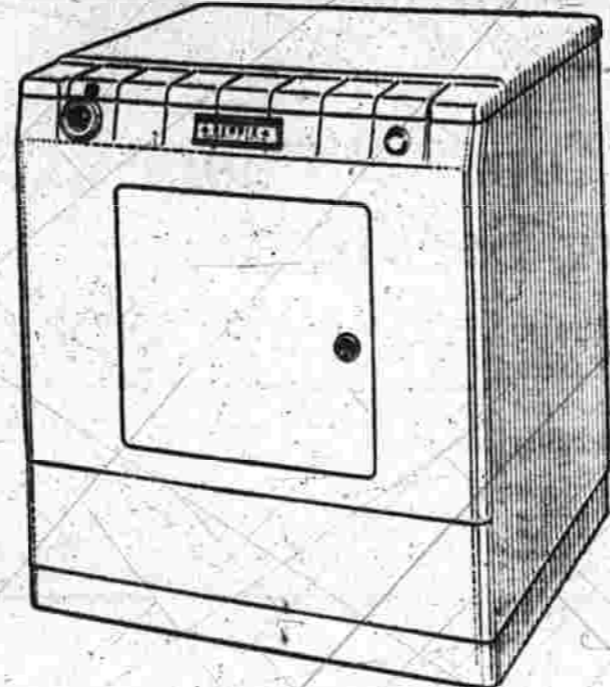

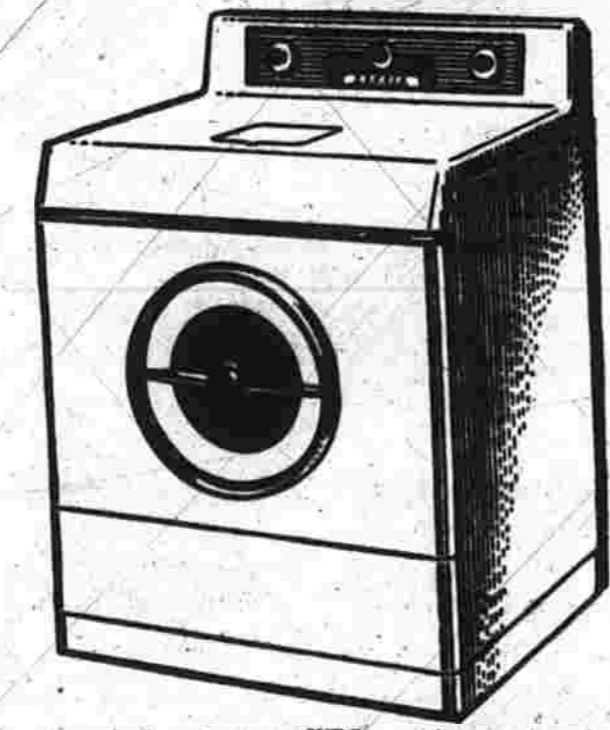

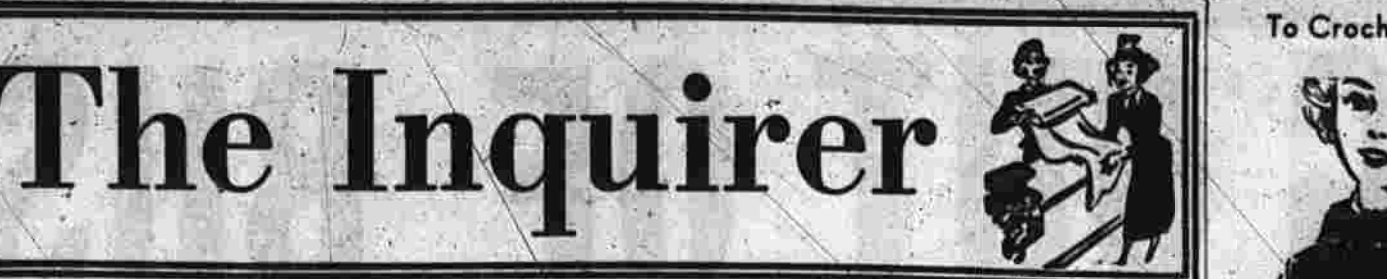

Track and Field Athletes Broke 31 Men's Records in 1954

London, Nov. 3.—Track and field athletes broke 31 men's world records to make the 1954 season the greatest since ancient Greece both in quantity of records and quality of performances.

During the year, 20,313 athletic marks were passed for the first time. A mile was run in less than four minutes and the shot was thrown through the air for more than 60 feet.

But the season was significant for many reasons and several performances were so outstanding that track experts agreed the year was the best man's body capable of. "What are the limits of its strength and endurance?"

Russia Shows Power

Of major importance was Russia's surprising for the first time in the United States in the parade of setting world marks.

eight records in the 1954 season which the United States set seven. Little, Czechoslovakia, had six. While Australia and Great Britain set three apiece. The remaining 15 went to men from Norway, Finland, Hungary and Denmark.

Until 1954, the 5,000 meters race had been run in less than 14 minutes only once, by Gunder Hergz of Sweden in 1947.

During 1954, the 5,000 meters was run in less than 14 minutes five times.

Meanwhile, the three mile race was broken four times.

Records fell at such a pace that Britain's Chris Chubbaway ran second in five world record setting races before he managed to set a mark of his own. Even then his mark in the 5,000 meters lasted only 17 days.

For 50 years the four minute mile had been a goal for runners

from English speaking nations who measure the distance in inches, feet and miles. Dr. Roger Bannister of Britain broke through that almost magic barrier with his 3:59.4 mile at Oxford, England, on May 6.

Forty-six days later, Australia's John Landy broke Bannister's mark with a 3:58.0 in London.

Before another month and a half passed, Dr. Bannister and school teacher Landy again broke the four minute mile.

America's Pary O'Brien and thousands of other shot putters and javelin throwers set their marks in the 5,000 meters.

O'Brien passed the landmark one-eight last May before he took

off his sweat suit and during a day he repeated the heavy four more times. His longest put was 60 feet 10 inches. He set a world record of 1,500 meters record and 17 days later Landy broke it.

The Fordham University relay team ran the 4 x 800 yards faster than any other team in the world, a 4 x 860 yards or 4 x 800 meters.

His three best marks were 2:12.4 and 2:11.6 in the 400 yards and 2:08.2 in the 200 yards.

But closeness to track's immortal mark was not the main attraction.

What left track men gasping was the finish of the first four men in the field. Each of the four set a new world record.

As outstanding as many events and athletes were this year, possibly the most outstanding moment in running history came

when the little publicized 800 meters race in Bern, Switzerland, Aug. 28. The event was part of the European games.

Close To Greatest Mark

Leon Sestak, a 22-year-old Budapest student, won in 1:47.1, nearly by the 21 records set in the greatest race in the book—the 1:46.8 mark set by the late Rudolf Harbig of Germany in Milan in 1939. Harbig was killed in 1952. During 1953, he ran 1:46.2.

Norris McWhorter of London, a member of the Executive Committee of the Association of Track and Field Statisticians, studies track performances as closely as anyone.

He thinks 1954 is unsurpassed. "The year will be remembered for six big reasons—the four minute mile, the 60 foot shot put, the arrival of the Russians as a huge power, the 31 broken records and the passing of Gunder Hergz and Pary O'Brien."
