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PUC Approves Settlement In Change of Bus Route

A compromise settlement of the Silver Lane, to avoid having to proposed changes in the route of the Silver Lane Bus Line of Manchester has been approved by the State Public Utilities Commission, the commission announced yesterday.

The bus line was granted permission to change its route in the area of the intersection of Silver Lane and Main Street in 1951 at Hartford on east-bound trips to avoid a circuitous routing.

However, the route change was granted with the understanding that the company would continue to operate some buses over the present route for at least another year.

At the present time on its east-bound trips, in order to operate from the junction of Silver Lane and Main Street, the company's buses have to operate on Main Street south of Silver Lane to the Wilbur Cross Highway and then loop over the overpass back onto Main Street and north to Silver Lane.

The Commission ruling is necessary because a left turn from Main Street onto Silver Lane is prohibited by the state highway code.

The company asked permission to have its buses continue to operate on the Wilbur Cross highway to the point where the road meets

Egypt's UN Envoy Dies at Meeting

Dr. Mahmoud Armi, Egypt's chief delegate to the United Nations, died last night a short time after he collapsed with a heart attack while speaking in the Security Council.

The 63-year-old diplomat slumped to the floor while seated at a council table in the midst of a speech replying to an Israeli complaint against his government. He was carried to the U. N. clinic and died after several hours of treatment.

Dr. Stanley Kellman, assistant medical examiner for New York City, examined the body and reported the cause of death as a heart attack. Associates of the diplomat said he also had suffered from a heart ailment.

When stricken, Armi was making his second speech of the day in a debate involving Egypt's seizure of the Israeli freighter "Bat Galim" in the Suez Canal. After statements today by Egypt and Israel, other delegates called for a report on the incident from the U. N. Mixed Armistice Com-

party's 1952 standard bearer triumphed significantly throughout the country in a drive to put Democrats back in control of Congress, and carried the brand of the fight on the national level.

In another sense, however, the Democratic upsurge could make it harder for Stevenson. Democratic hopefuls may now figure the party's chances for a presidential victory in 1956 are bright, and could touch off a free-for-all scramble for the nomination.

A recent "new face" thrust into the national spotlight were 36-year-old Chester M. McNamara, who won the governorship of Pennsylvania by 200,000 votes to end 16 years of Republican rule, and Michigan's newly elected Democratic Sen. Patrick V. McNamara.

Leader, a lanky, bespectacled turkey farmer, was virtually a political unknown a month ago. As governor of a pivotal political state he should be a main watch during the next two years.

McNamara, a Detroit businessman and minor A.P.C. official, also shot up from virtual obscurity to national prominence as Ferguson, a key adviser to the Eisenhower administration and chairman of the Senate GOP policy committee.

Meanwhile, Michigan's 43-year-old Gov. G. Mennen (Bossy) Williams had in snap elections gained in prestige by winning a landslide victory for re-election. A Democrat, Williams won a fourth term in the governor's mansion—the first four-time winner in Michigan's history.

Another "first" in history was chalked up in South Carolina by J. (For James) Strom Thurmond, 48, who was elected U. S. senator over the official Democratic party candidate in a write-in campaign.

In New York, Averell Harriman, 62, broke a 12-year Republican reign by defeating GOP Sen. Irving T. Lee in a tight race for governor of New York.

Harriman, action of a wealthy railroad family and former high Washington official, said on election night he would support Stevenson for the 1956 nomination. He bid for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1952 but three his

Other Democratic winners mentioned as possible presidential candidates included Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, 46, of Texas; Sen. Estes Kefauver, 51, of Tennessee; Sen. Charles McNamara, 57, of Georgia, and Gov. Frank J. Lausche, 58, of Ohio.

The Senate Democratic leader in the last Congress, was re-elected for a second term, as was Kefauver.

One of the leading Democratic success powers in the Senate, was re-elected for a fifth term. He sought the presidential nomination in 1952, but failed to win any important support outside the Republican ranks.

Lausche was re-elected for an unprecedented fifth term as governor of traditionally Republican Ohio, the nation's fifth largest state.

The Rev. Nobel Prize Awarded to Dr. Pauling

Stockholm, Sweden, Nov. 4 (AP)—Dr. Linus Pauling, controversial California Institute of Technology professor, last night won the 1954 Nobel prize for chemistry. It was the third of this year's four Nobel awards to go to America.

The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences announced the honor was bestowed on Pauling for his discovery concerning the forces which hold molecules together, particularly in the body-building protein substances.

Some Physicists Win Shortly before Pauling was picked, the academy awarded the 1954 physics prize jointly to two West German scientists who helped lay the foundation of modern nuclear physics.

They are Dr. Max Born, 73, a former professor at the universities of Göttingen, Cambridge and Edinburgh, now living in retirement at Cambridge, England; and Prof. Walter Bothe, 63, of the Max Planck Institute at Heidelberg.

The academy said Born was honored "for his fundamental work in quantum mechanics, especially his statistical interpretation of wave function."

Bothe received the other half of the prize for his "contribution to the discovery of the cosmic radiation and the discovery he made with it. From his findings was developed a precision instrument enabling scientists to measure time intervals within the atom of less than a billionth of a second."

The Nobel awards, established by the will of the late Alfred Nobel, Swedish inventor of dynamite, are the highest international honors in science.

Pauling, 53, has been under fire several times in recent years for alleged Communist affiliations. He was among 50 scientists and educators identified by former Communist Louis Budenz as members of the party. Pauling denied that accusation in a sworn affidavit.

A native of Portland, Ore., Pauling lives in Pasadena, Calif. He has been a member of the staff of the California Institute of Technology since 1922 and also has taught at Oxford University, England, the University of California, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the University of Chicago.

Stove Fire Kills Six in Ohio Home

HAMILTON, Ohio, Nov. 4 (AP)—Fire, believed to have started when a heating stove exploded, took the lives of six members of one family in a little fire room frame house here yesterday.

Coroner Garry Boone of Butler County, listed the dead as: Myra Helen Mullins, 70; her wife, Mrs. Edith Mullins, 59; and her three children, Glenn Lee, 3; Joan 2; and Denise, 4 months old.

William Mullins, husband of Edith and father of the three children, was at work at the time. Bodies of all the victims but the elder Mullins were found in a bedroom on the first floor. Mullins' body was in a doorway connecting the bedroom with the living room.

Fire Chief George Schlotterbeck said the fire might have been caused by an exploding heating stove. Neighbors said they understood the younger Mrs. Mullins was a native of Detroit and that her maiden name was "Kellier."

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Hartford Museum Statue Is Stolen

Hartford, Nov. 4 (AP)—A valuable bronze statue in a collection donated to a Hartford museum by the late J. P. Morgan has been stolen, director Charles C. Cunningham reported yesterday.

The theft of the figure of the infant Dionysus, or Bacchus, God of wine, was missed last Thursday. Believed to be nearly 2,000 years old and valued at \$10,000 to \$15,000, the statue is 18 inches high and weighs about 30 pounds. It stood on a pedestal on the museum's street floor.

It is part of the Heortacal Collection of bronzes which Morgan purchased in Paris more than 50 years ago. A professional thief, who assigned a detective to the case, said they believe a crank or youngsters were responsible for the theft.

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ASK BRIDGE APPROVAL

Bozton, Nov. 4 (AP)—The Connecticut State Highway Dept. has asked the New England division of the Army Engineers Corps to approve plans for construction of a fixed highway bridge across the Housatonic River between Stratford and Milford, Conn.

The Army announced the Connecticut request yesterday to inform any persons desiring to submit a statement on the matter in the interests of navigation. The bridge would be situated 3.8 miles above the mouth of the river and about 100 feet downstream from the New Haven Railroad Bridge.
