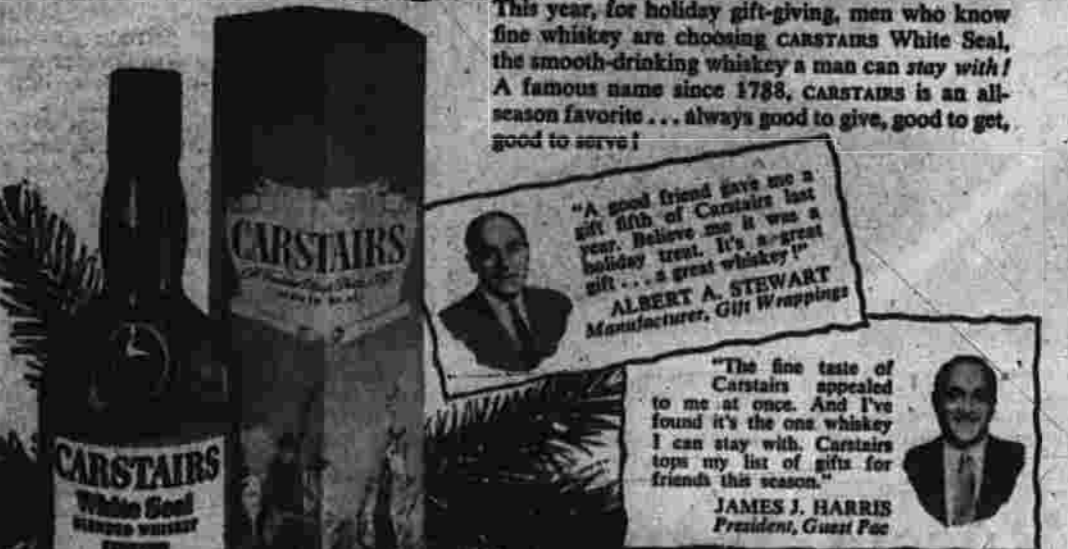

"I do know that, so far as the determination of the people of the United States want what I would call a group of progressive moderates handling the business and the politics of what I am working for..."

These quoted statements were made by President Eisenhower at his press conference Wednesday, as he responded to questions about his administration's relations with his own party, and the McCarthy controversy.

For this happens to be politics in the best and highest sense—the enunciation of a principle and platform to which people will rally because it is their own instinct to do so. Politics, in the highest sense, is a reading of the best that is in the people themselves and an offering of it to them again.

It is one of the great ironies of history, and perhaps one of the great tragedies, too, that we and the government of West Germany are both engaged in the process of trying to make the people of Germany enthusiastic about the process of rearming themselves.
