Uncle Sam Gives No Leave For Adoptions

WASHINGTON — Uncle Sam can be very generous in grantng maternity leave — to married or unmarried employees But he draws the line at time dopt new born bables. With orphanages, foundling homes and places like Junior Village here alreadly overcrowd d, the government's hard line on adoptions seems strange.

In general, an expectant federal mother can get about six weeks off before the expected birth and up to eight weeks after delicvry. That's not free

She must have enough sick or

up to be paid. If she doesn't have that much time, the government will put her on leave without pay, but her job is guaranteed on her return. Women in government who adopt new babies can take their vacation time to get the baby settled in. But they can't be given sick leave time, for that purpose, or given a job guar-tee if she can manage leave

without pay. The government sees the sit-uation strictly (and perhaps correctly) along medical lines. A women should be off work six weeks before delivery and she needs at least that much time afterward to recover, and look after the baby.

Even in the case of unmarried mothers, the Civil Bervice Commission urgen agencies to make their own leave decisions "bay ed on humane considerations and for health reasons. The fact that a person is the parent of an illegitimate child, CSC says, "does not in itself disqualify" the person from the right top maternity leave, or a guaranteed job on her return. But adoption is another matter. One such new mother, who idopted a tiny baby, was refused sick leave or leave without pay for six weeks to take care of the newborn. Her agency couldn't let her off because she wasn't sick, and she wasn't entitled (according to the rules) to

It happens that this particular. woman couldn't have a baby. but wanted one. She would also like to stay home full time, but needs to work. Despite the need for more forter parents, and despite the government's liberal policy for married or unwed natural moth ers, there is no "break in" time allowed for those who have to adopt. As somebody once said. there ought to be a law.
